MRS. M. LAVERICK

Died Last Saturday Evening--Funeral Rites Held Monday.

Funeral services for Mrs. Milcah Laverick, familiarly known as Grandma Laverick, who died last Saturday evening, following a stroke of paralysis on Wednesday of last week, were held at the M. E. church on Monday afternoon. Rev. Ernest Shepherd of Centralia, assisted by Rev. C. M. Temple, local pastor, conducted the services.

Many sorrowing relatives and friends attended the last sad rites. There were also many beautiful floral offerings.

A quartet composed of Mesdames Lillie Bowman, Hilma Hobbs, Messrs. Oscar Witt and Chas. Smith, with Mrs. O. P. Witt presiding at the piano, furnished music for the occasion.

The pallbearers were Messrs. James Astell, Robert Miller, George Cook, Mark Moore, Thos. Bergfield, Russell Astell.

Interment was made in the Fairfield cemetery.

Relatives from a distance attending the funeral were: Thos. Smith, Robert Smith, Mrs. Jas. McCormick and sons, William and Louis, Mr. and Mrs. John Prewitt, Mrs. Geo. Bennett and Miss Sarah Gray of Jacksonville.

Mrs. Milcah Laverick was born in Yorkshire, England, Feb. 13, 1853, but came with her parents Robert and Mary Smith to America, when she was a very small child, and settled on a farm near Woodson, Illinois.

On April 1, 1873 she was united in marriage to Thomas Laverick and they continued to live on a farm near Woodson, Illinois until the spring of 1881 when they removed to a farm one and one-fourth miles south and east of Broadlands, Illinois. Twenty-six years later, in 1907, Mr. and Mrs. Laverick retired to Broadlands, where they lived until death called them from their temporal to their eternal home; Mr. Laverick having passed away in 1915, and Mrs. Laverick on December 10, 1927, at the age of 74 years, 9 months and twenty-seven days.

To this union were born six children, three boys and three girls: William Edwin, Lillie B., Ira F., Annie E., Mary E., and Roy Elmer. Ira F. alone among the children, survives to mourn the loss of his mother. She is survived also by four brothers and sisters: Robert Smith, Thos. Smith, Mrs. James McCormick and Mrs. Fred Gray. There survives also a daughter-in-law, Mrs. Ira F. Laverick. This does not take into account the almost countless number of neighbors and friends, everyone bereaved. Surely a beautifully sweet character has gone from our midst; but we know that we now have one more treasure laid up in heaven.

No worthy cause ever failed to move the generous soul of Mrs. Laverick and her benefactions were many and wise and good. She was a life member of the Ladies Aid of Lakeview Hospital and was a charter member of Methodist Episcopal Church in Broadlands, to which fellowship she brought her membership from her home church in Morgan County.

Last Villa Grove Vet Returns Home

Charles Hixon, an ex-service man who had not been home for many years and whose mother, Mrs. Anna Smith of Villa Grove, had had no word from him since December 17, 1923, returned to his mother in Villa Grove recently. Mrs. Smith had searched everywhere for news of her son, and lately renewed her efforts at finding him when the state recognition board at Springfield had announced that an unclaimed bonus was awaiting him.

Mrs. Smith had sent a photograph of her son to the American Legion at Danville asking them to help her locate her son, and the word had been broadcast on local stations seeking to locate the man.

Inquiry at the state recognition board office revealed that the bonus award check was made out in the man's name and that no one but he could get the money until he was found and identified or was proven dead. His mother stated that the last word she had from him was from Brooklyn, N. Y., on December 17, 1923, at which time he was working on transport vessel service. Mr. Hixon was a boiler-maker by trade and had worked in the shops of the C. & E. I. railroad at Villa Grove before entering the service.

Charles Hixon has returned as mysteriously as he disappeared and his award can now be claimed without further trouble.—Review.

Hold Bourbon Farmer After Baby's Death

Tuscola, Dec. 12. — George Lewis, 55, of Bourbon was held in the county jail today, his wife was in the local hospital suffering with bruises and cuts about the head, and their ten-months-old daughter was dead in a local undertaker's establishment.

Lewis, authorities declare, beat his 35-year-old wife, Bertha, on the head and shoulders with a stove-poker, Saturday afternoon while he argued against her obtaining medicine for the baby's cold.

During the argument, Lewis is alleged to have snatched the baby from her arms, dropping the infant on the floor as he did so.

Mrs. Lewis declares the baby was killed. Lewis claims the child smothered during the night which followed.

A coroner's inquest was being held late this afternoon to act on information filed by physicians who performed an autopsy on the child's body to determine whether it died from the fall, or from smothering.

An x-ray picture taken of the child's body just previous to the start of the autopsy, at 3 o'clock disclosed that one of the vertebrae in the child's spinal column had been dislocated, but physicians positively refused to form any conclusion in the matter until after a formal autopsy.

Lewis is now held on a charge of assault with intent to kill his wife, authorities declare, but it is probable that a more serious charge will be pressed against him should it be found that the fall caused the baby's death.

Tuscola, Dec. 13—Verdict of coroner's jury reads: "Child came to its death by violent means during a fight between Mr. and Mrs. Geo. Lewis." No blame was fixed beyond this statement by the jury, which advised "a thorough grandjury investigation into the matter."

My Project Story

Having enrolled in the Animal Husbandry class it was necessary for me to carry a project to completion.

I first decided to take up the care and management of one hundred laying hens. But as several other boys who did not live on the farm at the present time could take no other project except poultry I abandoned this project and took up dairying.

To start with I was milking two cows but later on three cows made up the project. The records were kept for butterfat production, the milk was weighed each morning and evening from each cow separately. Besides being on pasture a part of the time they were fed a ration consisting of corn, ground oats and soy bean hay.

The cream was sold while the skim milk was fed to the hogs. The barn was kept as clean as possible under the existing condition. In all this project was carried on about seven months starting in November and ending the latter part of May.

I carried on this work with the idea of finding the relative merits of proper care and feeding with cows of not overly good production records.

The care and management of these cows was a very interesting experiment besides being beneficial in gaining experience in caring for live stock.

**C. I. P. S. MAN AWARDED
INSULL MEDAL FOR SAVING
LIFE OF FELLOW EMPLOYEE**

Canton, Illinois, December 7.—Harry A. Calhoun was awarded an Insull Medal here this afternoon at a meeting of Division E employees of the Central Illinois Public Service company, by J. Paul Clayton, vice-president, for saving the life of Loren Keeney by resuscitation. Mr. Calhoun, a line foreman for the Public Service Company, resuscitated Mr. Keeney by the Schaeffer Prone Pressure Method of Resuscitation on January sixth, after Mr. Keeney had suffered a severe electric shock at Fairview, Illinois. The Insull Medal awarded to Mr. Harry A. Calhoun is the one hundred and seventy-seventh medal issued through the National Electric

Light Association to electric employees who have saved lives by use of the prone pressure method of resuscitation. Mr. Calhoun is the sixth employee of the Central Illinois Public Service Company to receive such a medal and the second of the Division E forces, having headquarters at Canton.

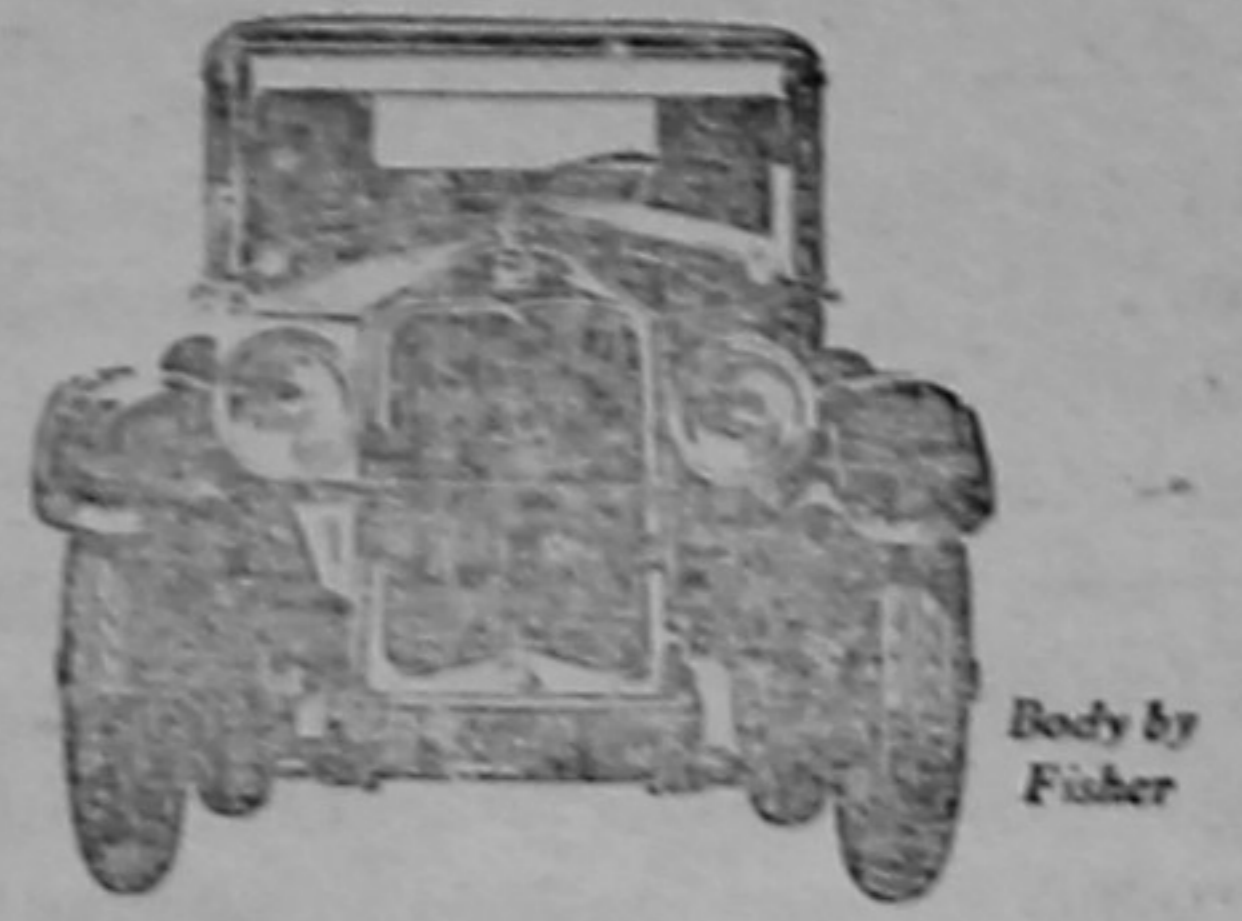
