## Obituary Of Mrs. J. S. Potter

The following is part of an obituary copied from the Grady County News, published at Tuttle, Oklahoma, Friday, April 6th. The deceased was a sister-in-law of Mrs. J. M. Astell, and was a former Allerton resident.

"Miss Lillie C. Koontz was born in Indiana, Sept. 6, 1866. She moved with her parents from Indiana to Illinois in early childhood and grew to young womanhood in Champaign county, Ill., where she met and married John Scott Potter, Feb. 27, 1890.

To this happy union were born five children, the oldest, a daughter who died in infancy, and four sons who survive their mother. Mr. and Mrs. Potter with their four sons moved from Illinois to Oklahoma in 1903, settling near Yukon, where they lived for several years, moving from there to Tuttle, where Mrs. Potter had been a staunch and active worker in church and civic affairs until the end.

Rev. M. F. Sullivan of Ryan, Okla., a former pastor of her church, held the funeral services, assisted by Rev. Humphrey, preaching from the text, "She hath done what she could."

She leaves her husband, four sons, Walter, John, Jim and Horace, and three grandchildren, besides other relatives and friends to mourn her departure."

## "Les Miserables" A Great Picture

France may well be proud of the epic film portrayal of Victor Hugo's famous classic, "Les Miserables," which appears at the Broadlands opera house on Friday and Saturday nights.

Perhaps never before in the history of motion pictures has a production been made with such fidelity. The towns in which the action of the novel was supposed to have taken place were reconstructed as they appeared a century ago.

The scenes representing Paris are said to have been built at the studio, as it was impossible to reconstruct the actual streets. These massive and beautiful sets have the authentic look of time, and it is difficult to believe that they are not real like the others.

Gabriel Gabrio, in the character of Jean Valjean, proves himself a fine actor. His role is a difficult one to portray, but he makes the part exist. He is first seen in the prison scenes. These were taken at the old prison at Toulon, convicts enacting the extra roles. When he emerges from the gray walls after the long imprisonment he presents a figure that is forbidding indeed, for the remaining spark of human sympathy in the man has been buried deep under the hardened lava of hate.

The striking transition that takes place after the kindness of Father Myriel has fanned the dying spark of love into a fire of regeneration is portrayed by Gabrio with matchless art.

The sensational scenes at the barricades when the soldiers of the Empire storm the stronghold of the communists, are exciting in the extreme and filled with pulsating drama. Throughout the entire length of the stupendous production one is held in the grip of interest, sympathy and suspense. It is really a great picture.

**Ex-Allerton Man Is Radio Expert**

Allerton, Illinois, April 7.—Roscoe Pugh, former resident of this place and a son of Mr. and Mrs. E. K. Pugh, has become an expert radio operator according to the Lake Wales News, of Lake Wales, Fla.

Mr. Pugh built the first receiving set in this part of the country. At that time everything was in code form and strange to say he still uses the code in conversing with his radio friends. Before leaving here about six years ago he built a sending outfit and was a licensed sender. From here he went to Broadlands, where he was chief engineer in the WSRF station owned by Harden and Dicks. Three years ago he went to Florida.

All the time he has worked on his outfit, which is both a receiving and sending concern. According to the southern newspaper, he has been heard as far as Canada, Australia and over most of the United States. Mr. Pugh talks direct to a person at Ogden, who relays the message to his parents in Allerton. Mr. Pugh is an automobile mechanic as well as a radio expert.

**Capture Gang of Kidnappers Near Chicago**

Chicago, April 7.—Kidnapped a week ago and held for \$100,000 ransom, Thomas Gaynor, rich automobile dealer and hotel owner, was rescued today by five squads of Chicago detectives who captured four of the alleged kidnappers.

The detectives, armed with machine guns and shot guns, began their expedition at midnight, when five automobile loads of them roared away towards the northwest.

Their work had not been completed, said Michael Hughes, commissioner of police, and he would not reveal the details of the release of Mr. Gaynor, the capture of the kidnappers or their identities.

**Poisons Well to Kill 300 Persons In Camp**

Fouke, Ark, April 7.—Dread of the poorhouse was believed to have driven 70-year-old Mrs. Nancy Lynn to attempt the extermination of 300 people, the inhabitants of a lumber camp.

When virtually all of the camps inhabitants — men, women and children — were taken ill with symptoms of severe poisoning, the community well was plumbed. There over a pound of poison was found, and investigation revealed that Mrs. Lynn had purchased a quantity of poison a short time ago, officers said. Today Mrs. Lynn, with her brother, Morris, faced charges of assault with intent to kill.

Valuable timber holdings had been left Mrs. Lynn's children by their father, and these had been sold to operators who owned the camp at which the poisoning took place. Mrs. Lynn, her children said, had tried to prevent the sale of the timber, holding to the idea that once her children had received their money she would be left penniless and a charge on the community.

**Will a Goat Full of Dynamite Blow Up?**

Aurora, Ill., April 6.—Harry Gulich is looking for someone to untie his goat.

The trouble is, the goat swallowed some dynamite which Gulich wanted to use in blasting stumps, and there seems to be some uncertainty as to whether dynamite surrounded by a goat still is effective.

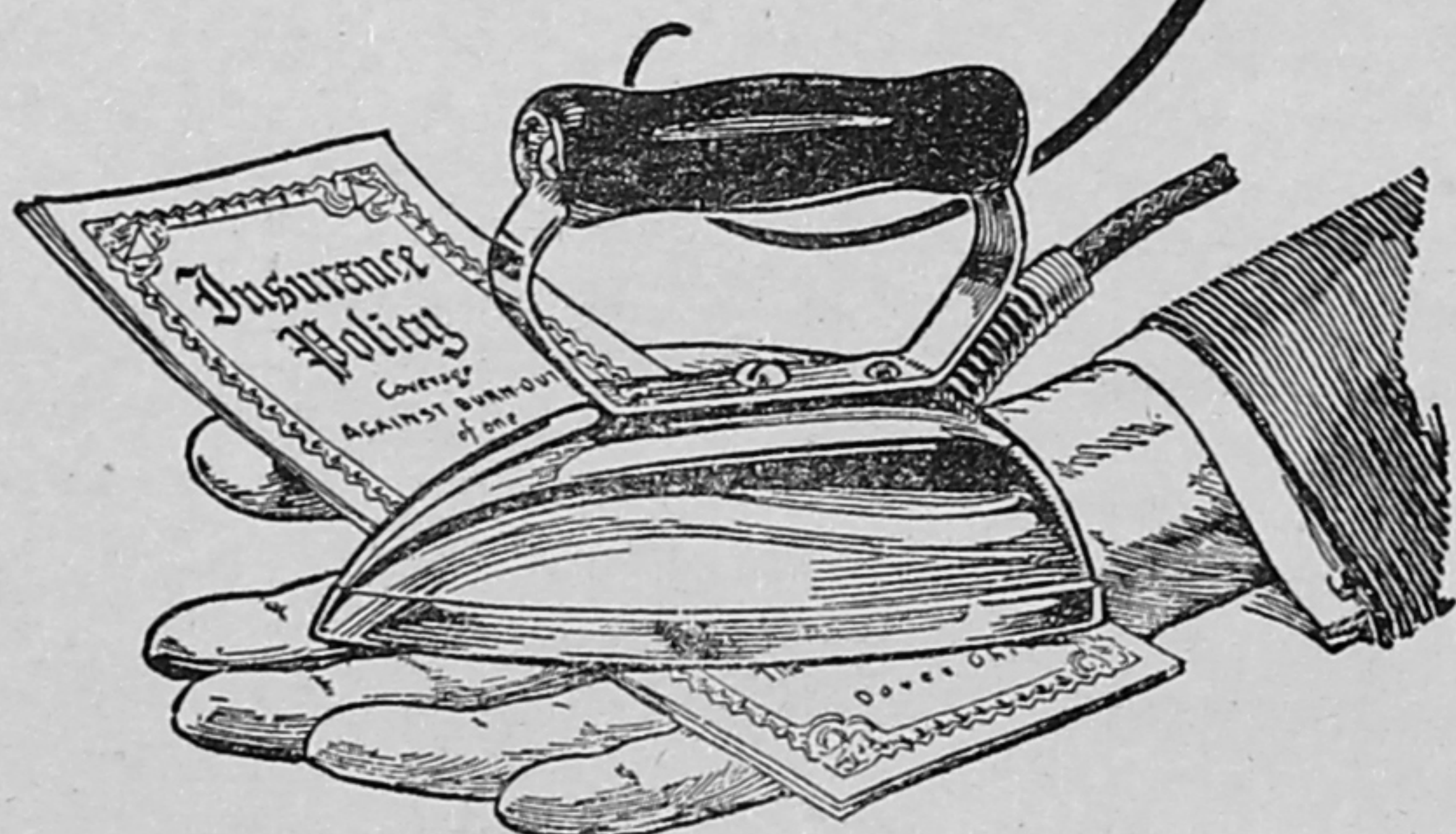
