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Potatoes as Food

Except in Ireland, the general use of the potato covers a period of less than 150 years. In Ireland the potato became a staple article of diet about a century earlier, and from this fact arises the name Irish potato, although its origin appears to have been in Peru, where the natives have eaten it from time immemorial.

From Peru the potato was first carried to Spain by early Spanish explorers of the New World, and thence into Italy, but it was merely looked upon as a curiosity, and as such was seen in the botanical gardens of Europe for two centuries or more before its adoption for food purposes became general.

Sir Walter Raleigh is said to have been the first to cultivate the potato in Ireland, about 1592. At first it was used for feeding hogs, but little by little experiments were made to demonstrate that it was not harmful to human beings, so that it very gradually came into use for food, particularly during periods of famine.

It was not until about 1750 that the potato gained a permanent foothold in England and on the continent of Europe, and it was cultivated but little in America before that time.

The spread of potato culture was greatly accelerated by the scarcity of food following the Napoleonic wars in the early part of the nineteenth century, since which time its use has steadily increased.

Early Photography

While experiments which led to the ultimate development of photography were made as far back as about 1778 by Scheele, a Swedish chemist, followed by the labors of Wedgwood in England, Seebeck in Germany and many others, it remained for two Frenchmen, Niepce and Daguerre to give to the world the first practical photographic process.

Niepce discovered a method of making photographs that would not fade in 1825, but it was not until 1839, six years after Niepce died, that his co-worker Daguerre developed the daguerreotype, which marked the beginning of commercial photography.

In their earliest experiments, it required exposures of three to eight hours in bright sunlight to secure a photographic copy, but the first daguerreotypes were made by exposures of about half an hour. In the beginning only landscape, monuments and the like could be used as subjects, as no living thing could be kept quiet sufficiently long.

The first photographic personal portrait was made by Prof. John W. Draper, an American chemist, in 1840, after which improvements in processes followed in fairly rapid succession. Before 1840 the only means of preserving the likeness of persons was by making of death masks or through sculpture, paintings and drawings.

Now the goal of photographic science and art is to produce pictures in colors direct from the subject, toward which some preliminary steps have been taken.

In view of the wonderful advances being made in every branch of science, it can hardly be doubted that direct color photography will one day be an accomplished fact.

War on Rats

It is conservatively estimated that every rat in the country costs \$2 a year in food consumed and other damage done on farms and elsewhere. Realization of this fact has led to widespread efforts to exterminate these pests through organized community effort.

Through the use of calcium cyanide gas the citizens of one county in Ohio destroyed about 50,000 rats in a month. A vocational agriculture class in Illinois made rat killing a game, choosing sides in a contest to see which side could accumulate the largest number of rat tails.

In many other communities farmers, and citizens have waged war on the destructive rodents with excellent results.

The rat is one of the greatest enemies of mankind, being a carrier of disease, as well as a destroyer of property. Every possible means should be systematically employed for the extermination of this pest.

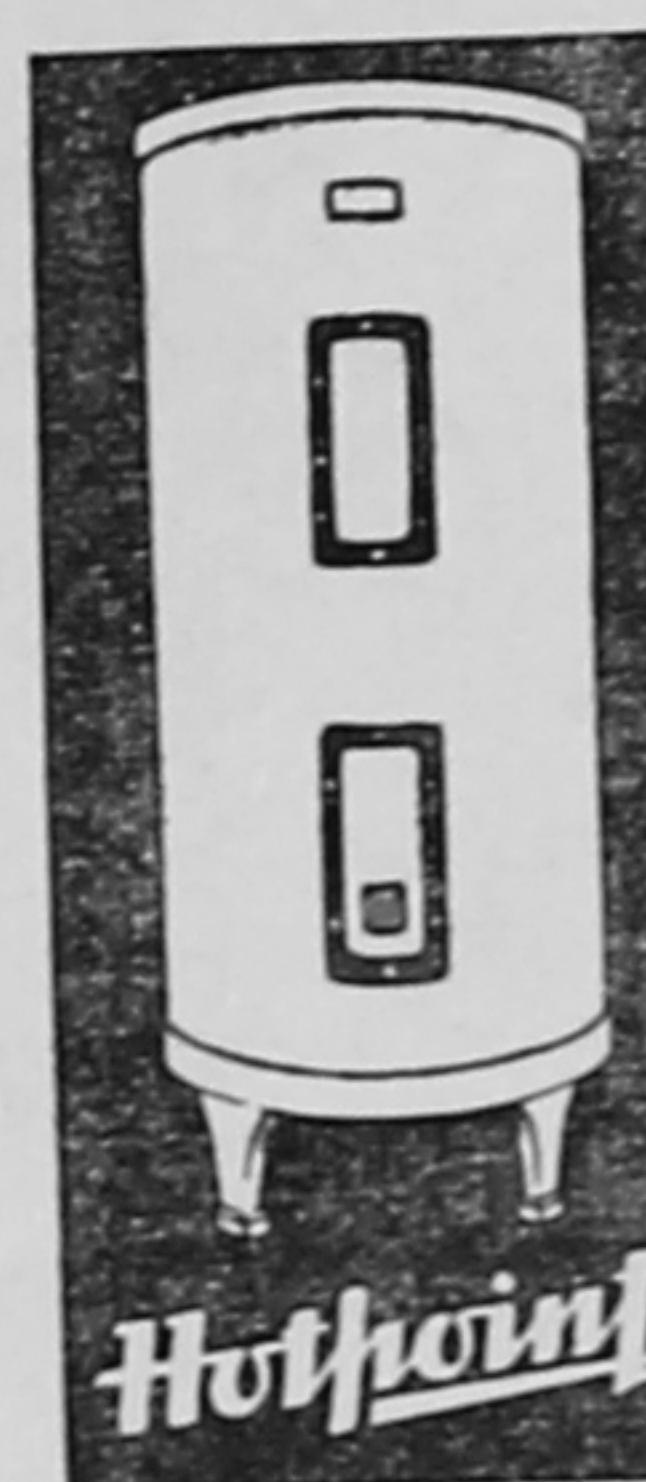

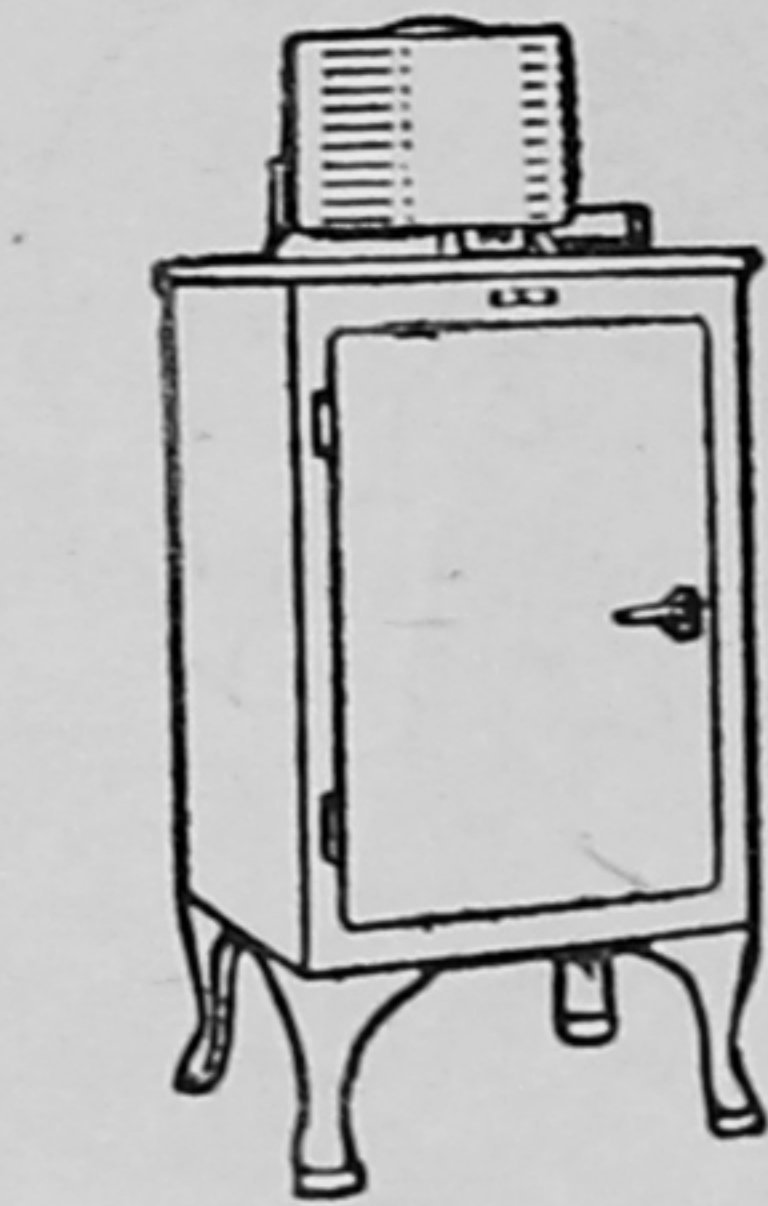

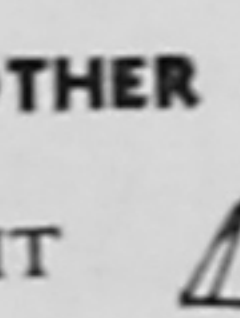
