Farmer Buying Power

Nothing reveals the improved condition and increasing buying power of the farmer quite so strikingly as some figures just issued by a large agricultural publication.

For example, to buy a certain popular low-price automobile, the farmer today pays 626 bushels of wheat. Two years ago tempted to make a speech. the same streamlined model, if it had been in existence then, which even his pen failed him, would have cost him 1,455 bushels, the yield from two and onethird as much acreage. A farm tractor costing him fifty-nine 200-pound hogs today would have cost him 131 such hogs in 1933.

Probably most surprising of all however, is the comparison of prices in the case of a gasolinepowered washer. For it the farmer pays today 117 bushels of corn. Two years ago it cost him 712 bushels, more than six times as much.

Declaration of Independence. Once when a friend asked how he could reconcile the phrase in the Declaration that "all men are created equal" with the fact that he, Jefferson, was a slaveholder, the author of the document is said to have replied: "I didn't think of that."

It may be said, however, that we are constantly surrounded. Jefferson was really opposed to slavery, and only held slaves who had come into his possession through inheritance or ownership by his wife. He never trafficked in them, and advocated their gradual emancipation. He secured the passage of a law forbidding further importations
