The hygienic problems, with the contingent issue of rational birth control, can be settled no more quickly than the. steady growth of popular education permits, and will be solved precisely as soon as would be safe, in all probability. Judging by the growing and intelligent interest in everything that pertains to health and sanitation, with special stress on vitality and longevity, I should say that this would take care of itself.

The religious problems, for the great mass of Anglo-Saxon civilization, no longer exist, in practical fact.

Feeling, as I do, that of these aspects of marriage the emotional can never be settled, the hygienic is on the way to being settled, and the religious has been settled, I now turn to the most important aspect of all for the woman of the Twentleth century-the economic.

This situation is not at all emotional and does not present the complications of individual vagaries. Though all the conditions are ripe for adjusting it, and though everybody's mind should be by now prepared for it, and though we are being steadily pushed to it, the public mind is not engaged upon it as in the hygienic field. It has not been politely retained as a gesture and preserved for its traditional and sentimental uses; on the contrary, it is violently resented and increasingly questioned. I believe it to be the cause of more dissatisfaction among married women than any other one thing, and believe that if it could be fairly settled it would result in more direct and immediate benefit and satisfaction to more women than the right of suffrage has ever directly effected.

And so it is clear that I believe that nothing about us will seem more absurd than the fact that while we babbled continually about the inestimable value of a wife and homemaker, she was actually worth whatever her husband felt like giving her!

It will seem idiotic to her that a successful, independent wage-earner should suddenly turn into a sort of ward, dependent upon whatever her guardian felt he could spare her for pocket money.

No one has ever contended that the American husband is not generous; he is probably the most generous husband on earth, man for man. But each one of the steadily increasing number of wage-earning women (and today every girl feels L herself a potential wage-earner) looks with a certain uneasy wonder at a future partnership when the conscience of the junior partner or vice president or managing director or executive secretary seems likely to prick her if she lays any definite claim to any personal income that goes much beyond board and clothes and legitimate expenses connected with entertaining.

The lucky wage-earner who can continue to pursue her career at home after marriage has long ago settled this question. Thoughtful women are even now considering very seriously whether some arrangement of parttime work, lightening of domestic responsibilities by various community activities, along the lines of day nurseries, food service, etc., cannot be made to give a little freedom to the wife who willingly relinquishes her old independence for family life, but who wonders if she must give up tentenths of it. I think we shall see this problem solved in the fairly near future. But it may take 50 years before the great mass of women who do nothing at all but the work that all men tell them is the greatest of all, can hope to receive, as automatically as the government receives the income tax, their obvious salary: a fixed proportion of their husband's income.





fact that when one hears an exceptionally well modulated low-pitched speaking voice, it attracts attention at once. To my mind it is one phase of the human personality that broadcasts one's culture almost more than any other evident thing. One may be well groomed, and may have the manners of a Chesterfield, but when his speaking voice is heard he unconsciously brings to the fore all the cultural heritage from his family tree.

I am sure it is not because I used to sing that makes me sensitive to speaking voices, for I have conversed with singers of unusual merit whose singing voices were soft and smooth as velvet, but whose speaking voices, strange to say, were as rasping and coarse grained as their singing voices were lovely. I have heard high lyric sopranos with low heavy and unlovely speaking voices until I wondered they did not offend themselves when speaking. It is a singing master's duty to cultivate both the singing and the speaking voice. This, however, is not always done. If some of our singers from the American speaking voice, Sunday. what can be expected of the laity?

When traveling in foreign countries the contrast is evident, for the occidental voice carries in its every speech the tension and "high strungness" of American life and manners. We are as a nation high keyed and hurried and our life is reflected in our speech. Our modern hurry-scurry is not conducive to placidity of mind or body, so how could our speaking voice, the outward index, respond different- cranking his car. ly?
