

Farmer's Friend

Two southerners sat near me in a crowded day coach recently and carried on a heated and revealing conversation. Both men were farmers, but their similarity ended there. They were not at all alike. One seemed to be about 70 years old. He spoke with a soft "Deep South" inflection. He had attended college, was well dressed and had lived in several big cities.

The other man was nearer 30, spoke with the accent of the delta country and was obviously a practical dirt farmer with very limited schooling. The conversation was about rice. The older man insisted that rice was not grown in Arkansas. "It would be so foolish," he said scornfully. "So long as Asiatic labor is cheap there will be no money in raising rice in this country."

Young Man Was Right.

The old gentleman almost persuaded the young man that he had been calling something rice that was not rice at all. I didn't intrude to say that I drive through miles of rice fields every time I make a trip from Searcy to Memphis, although I hated to see a man in possession of the truth so crushed under courteous language and ideas that have been out of date for 25 years.

Workers in the Arkansas rice fields are relatively well paid, as farm hands are compensated. They earn more than cotton choppers and priced right. Our growers could ship it to Japan in normal times and sell to Chinese rice, Coolie raised.

Custom-Built Economy.

It sounded quite familiar when the cultured gentleman - farmer explained, "The biggest part of the cost of anything is labor." Effect of Diet At 20 Below 0

From tests in which 12 volunteer 'human guinea pigs'' spent eight ing last night. hours a day in a temperature of 20 degrees below zero, the University of Illinois is learning about some got his base warmed. of the effects of diet upon human resistance to cold and upon human activities under cold conditions.

The knowledge is of special value to high-flying military aviators. It applies also to Army and Navy activities in the arctic, and to winter lor. outdoor workers in the northern United States, Canada, and Alaska.

The purpose of the experiments was to determine the effect upon cold-resistance of modifying the proportions of the three food elements -protein, carbohydrate, and fat-in In'. the diet. Also included was the effect of meals at shorter intervals.

Meals high in carbohydratesstarches and sugars—or in fats were crease in both internal and surface stage. body temperatures, and in reducing the effect of the cold upon the coordination of nerves and muscles. Eating three small meals at twohour intervals during an eight-hour instead of one larger meal in the middle of the period was found to increase the benefit of the diets.

Comparing the least favorable diet of one high-protein meal during the eight-hour cold exposure period with the best diet of three high-fat meals during the period, the research showed that the decrease in internal body temperature was reduced by two-thirds and the decrease in nerve-muscle co-ordination reduced

by one-half. The research was done in the Educational and Research hospital of the University of Illinois College of Medicine in Chicago. Co-operating short as that. in the project were men from the University's colleges of medicine,

Illinois U. Library Has 2,296,517 Items 3

The University of Illinois library, which for many years has contained more material than any other state university library and been exceeded in America by only four other educational libraries, now contains 2,296,517 books, manuscripts, maps, pieces of music, and pamphlets.

The main and departmental libraries on the Urbana-Champaign campus contain 1,807,417 volumes, 412 manuscripts, 4,772 maps, 16,071 pieces of music, and 384,505 pamphlets, and the division of the library on the University's Chicago campus for the colleges of medicine, dentistry, and pharmacy contains 74,015

volumes and 9,325 pamphlets. Impressive growth during the past year was recorded by the addition of 62,056 volumes. Despite the wartime decrease in student enrollment, wartime activity on the campus, including Army and Navy training programs and research, kept ?


