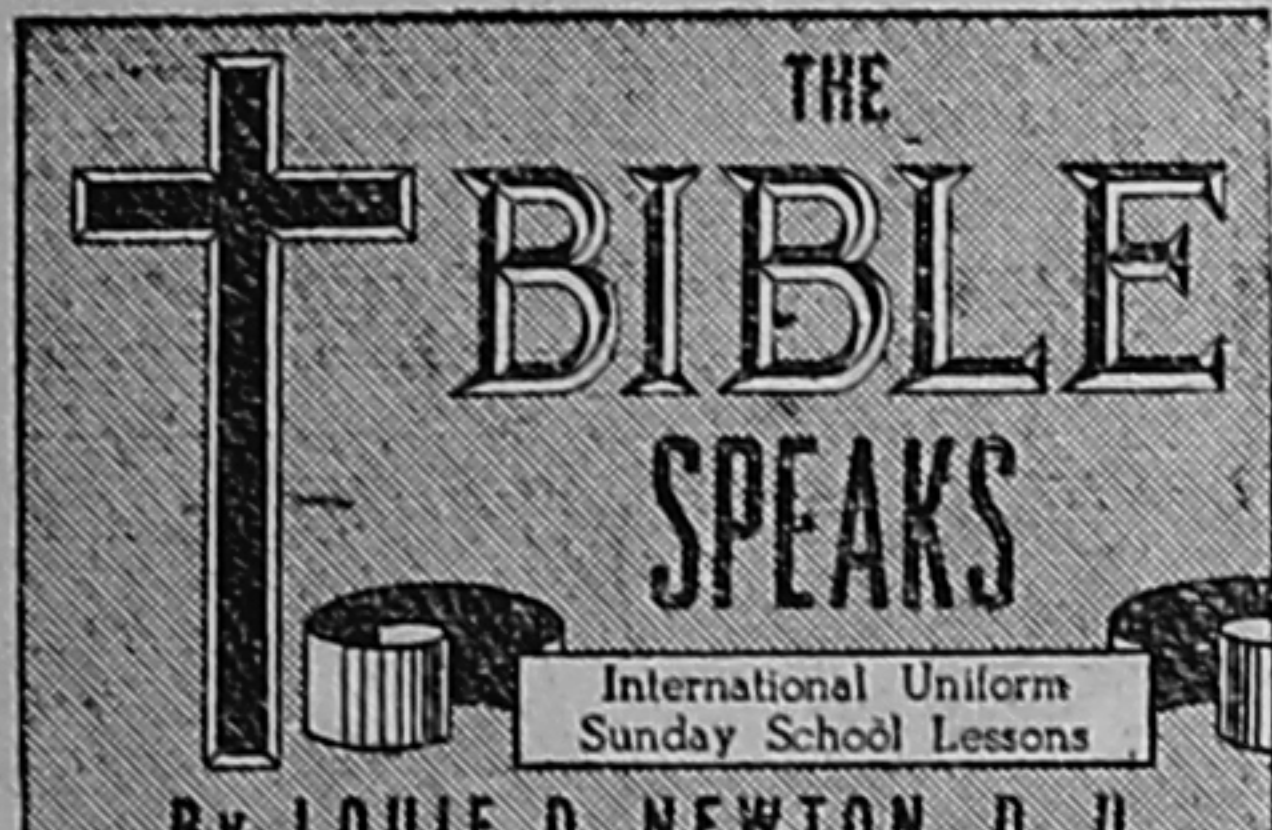

Here we have the hope of preservation, the hope of peace, the hope of security, the hope of usefulness, the hope of deliverance, the hope of dominion, the hope of service, the hope of sovereignty, the hope of redemption and the hope of purification.

A PROMISE FROM GOD

THIS is no fancied scheme of man. It is God's clear promise. "Therefore will I save my flock, and I will set up one Shepherd over them, and he shall feed them... and I the Lord have spoken it." God goes on to promise them peace by ridding them of danger, and security through his blessing upon the land. "There shall be showers of blessing."

LOOKING FOR A BETTER WAY

LONG had the people looked for a better way. Now God would provide that better way. It would be vouched safe unto them through the Good Shepherd. He knows the way, he holds the key.

The wistful hearts of the people must have been lifted up as Ezekiel and Zechariah shouted their prophecies of the coming Messiah. Many of these very passages have been used for the anthems which our choirs sing today. Well may every Christian employ them to tell of that better way in the midst of this troubled, changing world about us.

DANIEL'S DREAM OF THE DELIVERER

This dream of Daniel was a vision of the Messiah, bringing dominion, glory and a kingdom—a kingdom for all people, nations and languages. It is the universal hope of the ages, brought nearer through this inspired vision of the prophet. "For unto us a child is born, and unto us a son is given; and the government shall be upon his shoulder; and his name shall be called Wonderful, Counsellor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace."

This vision of the coming Messiah set every bell ringing in the heart of humanity.

SAVIOR AND KING FOREVER

ALL THE promises are embodied in these passages—Jesus the Saviour, Jesus the King, Jesus the Sanctifier. Here was hope for the Jews, and for all mankind. It was proclaimed through Jewish prophets, and Jesus was born of a Jewish mother. Favored, indeed, was that race. And although there be many who have rejected the Messiah, he fulfills the deepest meaning of every man's hope.

With Charles Wesley we sing:

Hail, thou long-expected Jesus,
Born to set thy people free;
From our sins and fears release us,
Let us find our rest in thee.
Born thy people to deliver,
Born a child, and yet a King,
Born to reign in us forever,
Now thy gracious kingdom bring.

God's Best Gift to Oppressed

Paul Robeson, Negro singer and actor, son of a slave, was a trifle emotional when he appeared before a Senate committee a few days ago.

He made it clear he thinks Russia is a great improvement on the United States, yet if he had put on in Moscow the performance he staged before the Senate committee, he would have been led out behind Mr. Stalin's garage and shot.

We don't do things that way in the United States. That's the chief difference between the United States and Russia. Robeson may rant as he sees fit within sight of the Lincoln Memorial. Not so in the Red Square in Moscow.

This country of ours isn't perfect. We would all like to patch it up here and there, but whatever its weaknesses may be, it has been God's best gift to oppressed human beings.

That statement is confirmed by the fact that, from all sections of the world, men and women struggle to get into the United States. So far as we know, Russia is not bothered by the immigration question. Even Paul Robeson doesn't seem to want to use his talents there.—Labor.

Anti-Red Law Needed

Some of the most convincing evidence that the Mundt-Nixon bill to curb Communism should become law has been furnished by the Communists themselves, in testimony before the Senate Judiciary Committee in its hearings on the measure.

William Z. Foster, general secretary and head of the Communist Party in the United States, told the committee recently that if there should be war between this country and Russia, American Communists would not fight against Russia. He also said Communists would not register with the Department of Justice if the bill became law.

Thus the position of the Communists is officially stated in unmistakable terms. This position was already well known, but it is well that it has been verified by their leader, so that there can be no doubt of it in the mind of anyone.

Negro singer Paul Robeson told members of the same committee that he would go to jail before he would answer a question as to whether he is a Communist. He admitted, however, that he has "many dear friends" among the Communists, and thinks that the Communist Party has "done a magnificent job in America."

Both Foster and Robeson praised Russia and denounced the foreign policy of the United States. Their attitude perfectly typifies that of all other Communists and fellow-travelers in this country, whose chief aim is to destroy the government of the United States.

In a recent address Speaker Joseph W. Martin of the House of Representatives declared:

"We shall hold up to the light of day any Communist activity in this nation, whether it be inside or outside the government. Subversionists seek refuge under the protection of the same Constitution and the same Bill of Rights they are attempting to destroy."

The Mundt-Nixon bill seeks to bring Communist activities into the light of day, as Speaker Martin suggests. It has already been passed by an overwhelming majority in the House, and should be promptly adopted by the Sen-

ate. No loyal citizen would be adversely affected by its enactment into law.

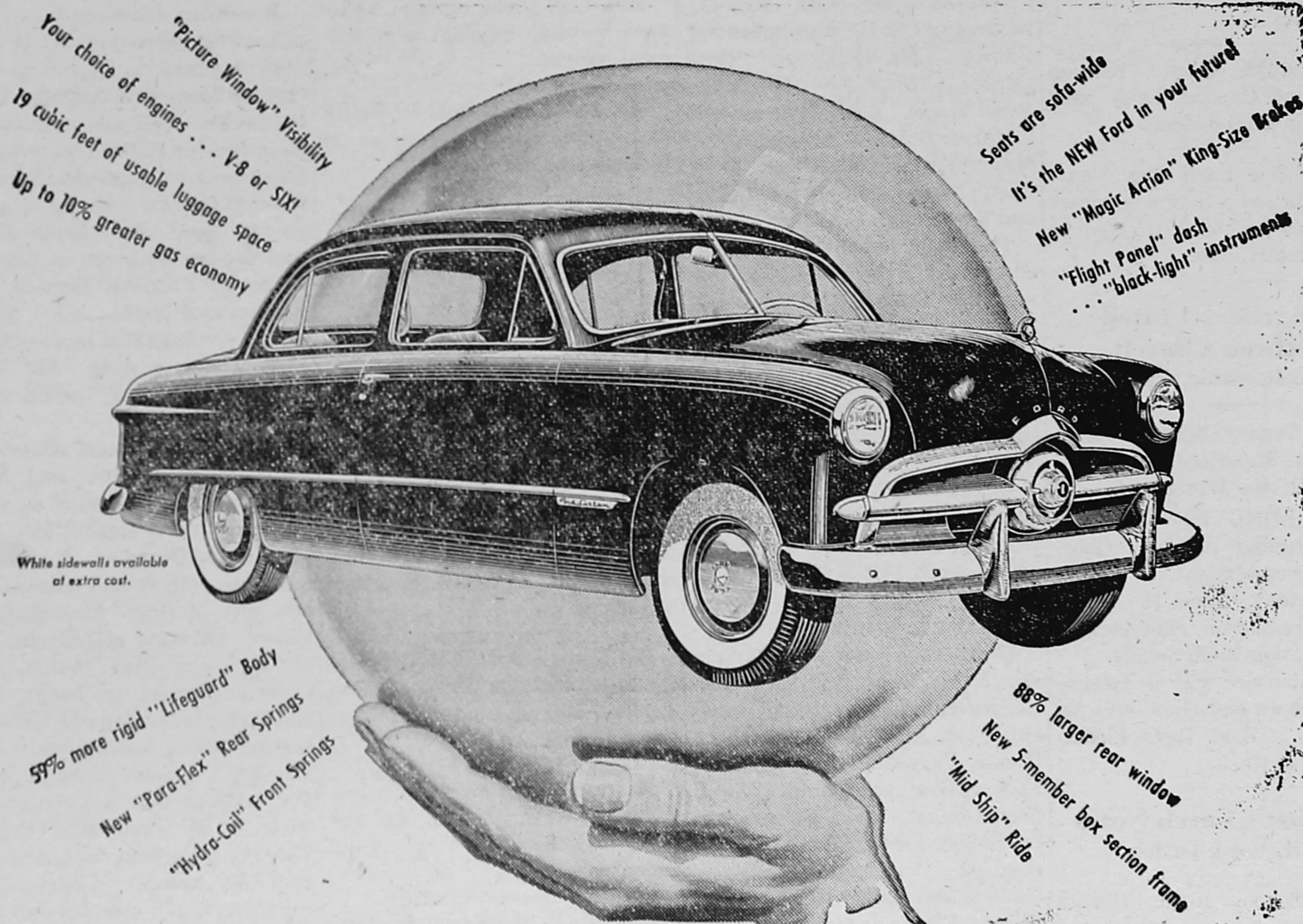

We were surrounded by natives, related the explorer. They just uttered savage cries, danced madly and beat the earth with their clubs.

Sounds like golf, said the bored listener.

What have you got there? asked Bill.

While my wife was away, returned Joe modestly, I made myself a pie.

A pie? It's kind of long for a pie, isn't it?

Of course it's long, answered Joe. It's rhubarb!

It's more or less understandable that the dignified cut-and-dried books on elevated standards of gustatory procedures should omit mention of practical methods of salvaging gravy.

It's one of those things about which a man has to use judgment. In high society a man is going to watch his P's and Q's, but in the comfort of his own home he certainly intends to get all the delicious gravy left on his plate.

If it's very thin and runny, the best way is to tip the plate and use a teaspoon. Don't try to put on the dog and tip the plate away from you, as the rules say for soup consumption.

A good many men have discovered they can fold a slice of moist bread and use this for a mop-upper.

One school of philosophy favors corn bread. After it's crumbled and mixed with the liquid it can be patted into mounds with a fork. But for everyday efficiency nothing is better than the buttered half of a hot fluffy biscuit. You can hold it easily; it sops up the gravy quickly; you can take a bite and then use the left-over section for further mopping.

The tool employed is not the vital point. Each man should experiment and use the equipment that is most functional for him.

Household Hints

Wax your dustpan; the dust will slide off more easily.

Fried bananas will help make the main course hearty. Serve with chicken, veal or ham.

Use golden raisins in dishes for a change. They are delicious with apples and celery in a salad.

More processing time is required in canning in a pressure sauce pan than in using a pressure canner.

Add a half-cup of coarsely chopped sweet pickle and a teaspoon of grated onion to a fish loaf to give it extra flavor.

If possible adults should eat four or five eggs a week. If not served at breakfast they make good luncheon dishes.

Always iron with the grain of the material when ironing bias-cut pieces. In this way you will avoid stretching the fabric out of shape.

You can make sour milk by adding two tablespoons of vinegar to one cup of sweet milk. This is convenient when a recipe calls for sour milk, and you have only sweet milk available.

For easy ripping out of machine stitching, cut the lower thread every one-half inch. This will leave the upper thread free and you can simply pull it out.

A good way to tighten a loose knob on a drawer is to place a washer made of sandpaper over the screw between the nut and the wood, on the inside of the drawer.

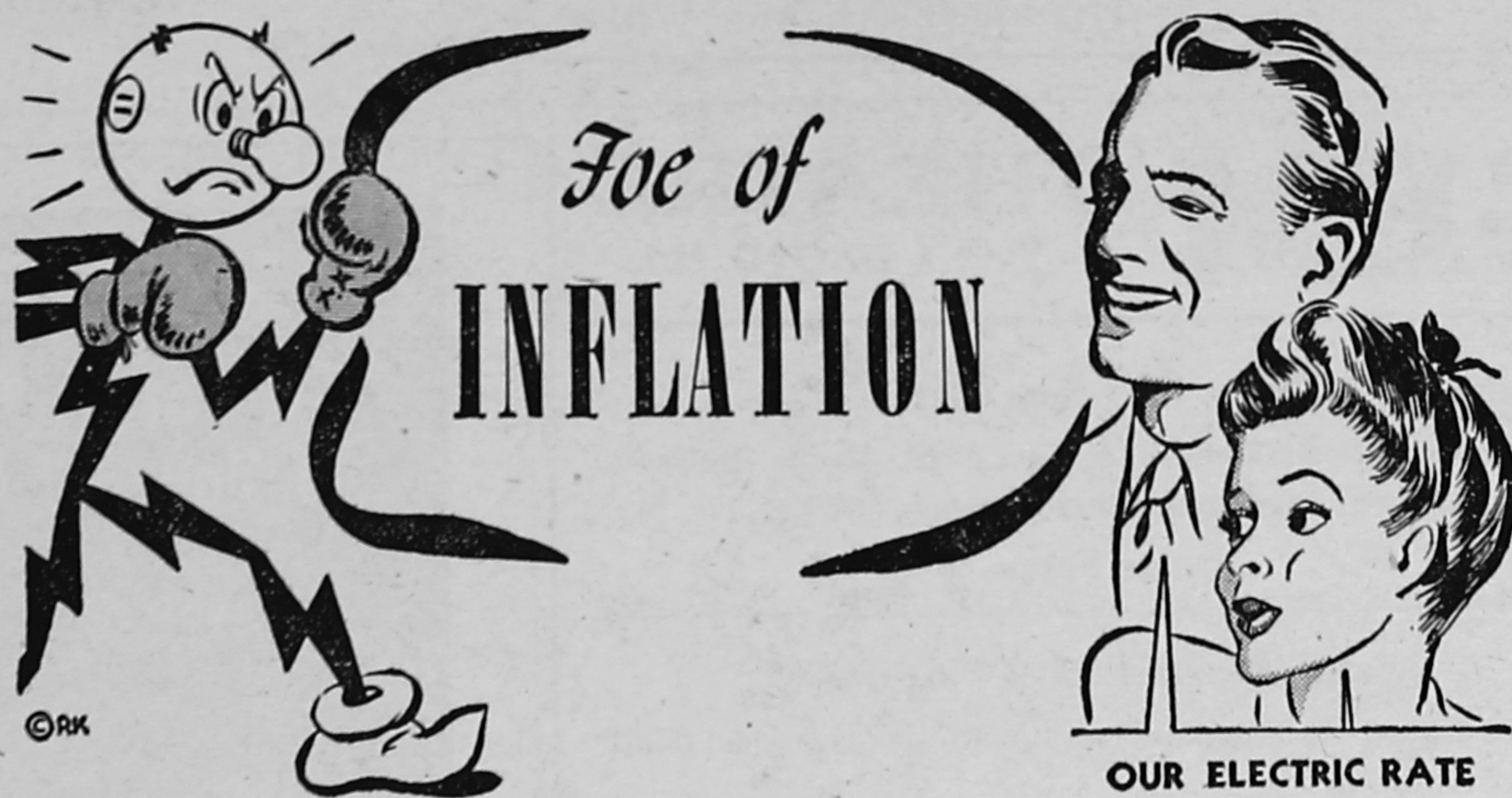

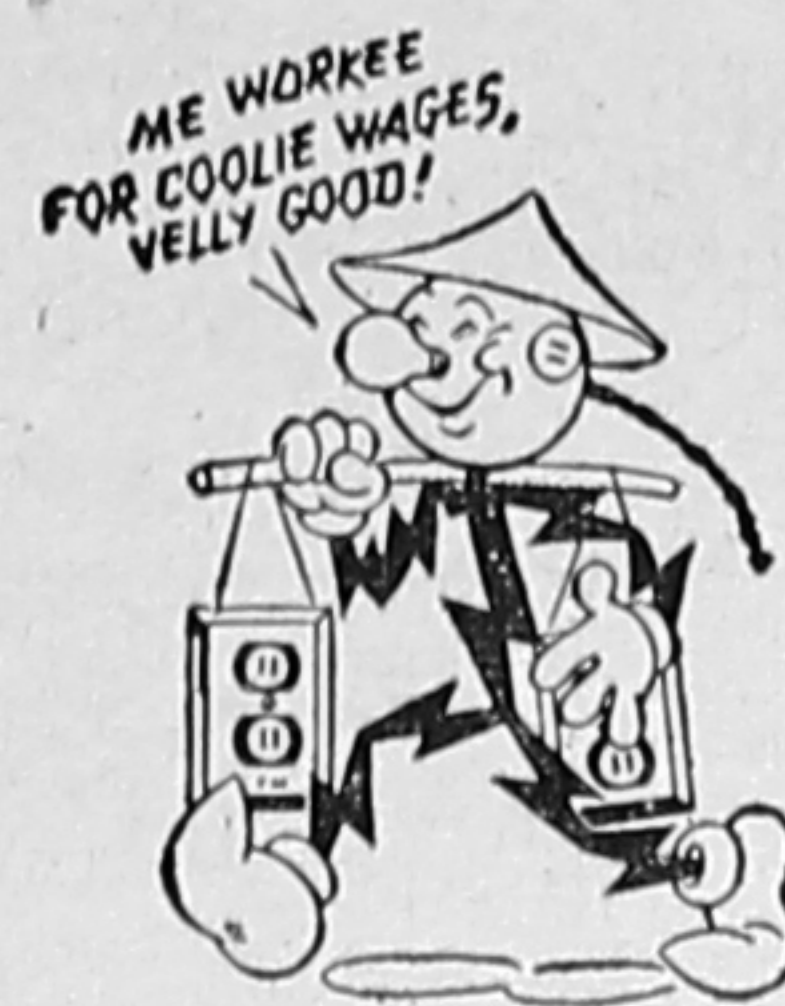

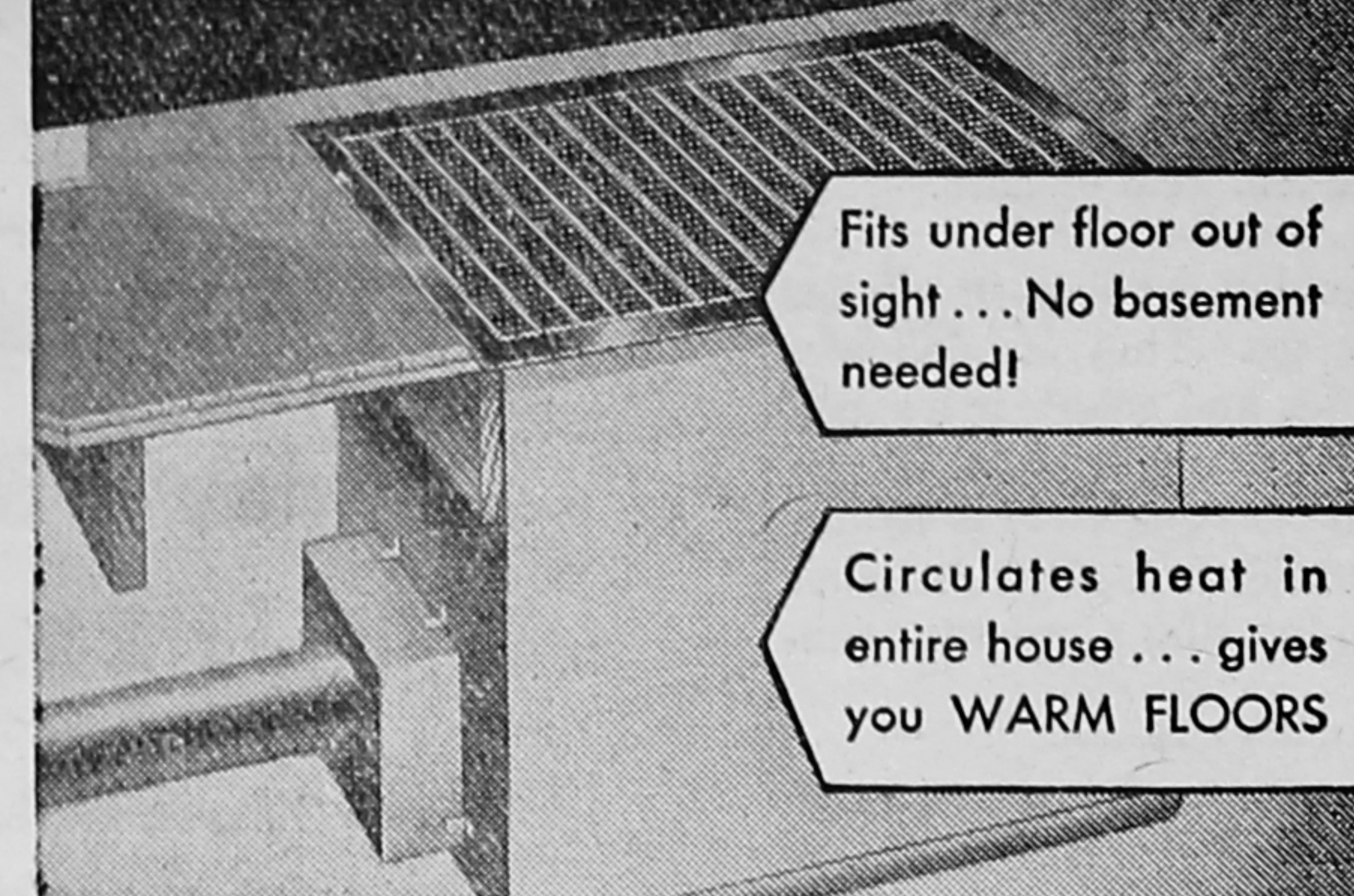
