

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



Aero Medical Unit To Study Air's Effects

Aviation, Sick People Both to Benefit At U. of I.

The new Aero Medical and Atmospheric Institute of the University of Illinois College of Medicine in Chicago will study aviation medicine, and will investigate the effects cold, heat, and barometric changes on the body.

Faculty members at the Institute will attempt to solve present-day problems in medical aviation. Research will include the study medical care for aviators who have been forced to make emergency landings in the Arctic and other cold regions.

Knowledge gained from research is expected to be of great value to the Army, Navy, and Air Forces. The Institute will train men for research and other types of work in the armed services. Problems of interest to civilian aviation will be investigated.

"The research also will be of particular interest to persons suffering from rheumatism and heart and lung diseases," Dr. A. C. Ivy, vice-president of the University of Illinois in charge of the Chicago Profsssional Colleges, said recently, "Patients with rheumatism, for example, have claimed increases in pain as a result of changes in weather.

Two low pressure chambers designed for human experimentation have been sent to the University by the U.S. Air Forces for installation in the Institute. The larger chamber is capable of handling 16 men. The smaller chamber is de-

signed for six-to-eight men. The chambers are capable of lowering atmospheric pressures to give | the equivalent of conditions encountered by pilots and passengers of aircraft flying at altitudes rang-

ing from sea level to 40,000 feet. The chambers will be used for numerous studies in aviation medicine. One of the studies will attempt to answer the increasingly important question of which patients should not be permitted to

Other research will involve studies on adaptation to high altitude, the effect of small changes of barometric pressure on arthritic and rheumatic patients, the effect of high altitude on the senses of smell and taste in man, and studies on dynamics of hemorrhagic shock at high altitude.
