What is one of the biggest bargains in Homer? A library card! All residents of Homer are entitled to get a card at no cost. Non-residents may buy a card for only \$24.00 per year—still a bargain. What do you get with a membership? We offer a selection of the latest bestsellers and other popular new fiction and non-fiction; we have books for all ages of children.

Our family oriented video collection includes many Disney movies and other children's favorites. These are also available to cardholders at no charge. Our magazines include *Time, Sports Illustrated, People, Good Housekeeping, Redbook* and *Consumer Reports*. We have recently changed our policy to allow current issues of magazines to be checked out for one week. Past issues will continue to be checked out for two weeks. Our multimedia computer has a number of CD-ROMs with materials on them for all ages, and patrons may also use the computer for their word processing needs.

In addition to all the materials in the library, we also offer expanded inter-library loan and reference capabilities with the addition of our on-line computer. Through the Illinois State Library, we are able to offer, at no charge, access to First Search—ten bibliographic databases of journals, periodicals, and papers presented at conferences, etc., with some databases offering full text. People who have an on-line service for their computer can access First Search through several means—Prairienet, a commercial on-line service, or direct internet connection. For more information on First Search and to get the authorization number and password, see a librarian.

Our Christmas story hour will be held on Wednesday, December 11th at 10:30 a.m. Registration is required. Come in to register; or call 896-2121 during library hours.

We are pleased to announce that Jody Bryan has given the library a copy of her book of poems and devotionals. Sue Roberts assisted with the editing, and the design of the cover. Come on in and see their work!

We now have the next four books in Larry Gnagey's Family Book Series. These were provided to us by the Early American Museum in Mahomet. If you enjoyed his previous books of local history/storytelling, you'll like these too.

Several other authors of new books have a tie to Illinois. They are Karen Cushman, who was born in Chicago and wrote The Midwife's Apprentice; and Stella Pevsner, writer of *I'm Emma: I'm a Quint.* Ms. Pevsner was born in Lincoln, Illinois, and attended both Illinois State and Northwestern Universities.

Temple Grandin, author of *Thinking in Pictures*, has a Ph.D. from the University of Illinois in animal science. She tells the fascinating story of her life in autism and how it aided her ability to design livestock-handling facilities. You may have seen her story on television.

Among our new books are several with a Christmas theme: *Certain Poor Shepherds* by Elizabeth Thomas Marshall, *This Year It Will Be Different* by Maeve Binchy, *The Special Guest* by Lee and Donna Allen, and *The Christmas Tree* by Julie Salamon, a large print edition. *The Christmas Box* is not new, but it has returned to the bestseller list.

Bestsellers recently added to our collection are: My Gal Sunday by Mary Higgins Clark, M is for Malice by Sue Grafton, My Sergei: A Love Story by Ekaterina Gordeeva (the skater whose husband/skating partner died last year of a heart attack), and Slouching Towards Gomortah by Robert Bork.

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

The membership requirements are:

- a:) Mothers, wives, daughters, sisters, granddaughters, great-granddaughters and grandmothers of members of the American Legion. Step-relatives are also eligible.
- b:) Mothers, wives, daughters, sisters, granddaughters, great-granddaughters and grandmothers of all members and women who were in the Armed Forces of the United States during any of the following periods:
 - 1. World War I—service between the dates of April 6, 1917 to November 11, 1918;
 - 2. World War II—service between the dates of December 7,1941 to December 31, 1946;
 - 3. Korean—service between the dates of June 25, 1950 to January 31, 1955;
 - 4. Vietnam—service between the dates of December 22, 1961 to May 7, 1975;
 - 5. Grenada/Lebanon service between the dates of August 24, 1982 to July 31, 1984.
 - 6. Persian Gulf—service from August 2, 1990 to end of hostilities as determined by the U.S. Government; all dates being inclusive, or who being citizens of the United States at the time of entry therein, served on active duty in the Armed Forces of any of the governments associated with the United States during any of the said periods, and died in-the line of duty on or after honorable discharge;
- c:) and to those women who of their own right are eligible to membership in the American Legion.

Junior members are those under the age of 18 years of age. Senior members are those over the age of eighteen years of age.

The Homer Unit #290 will be sponsoring a Community Blood Drive at the community building on December 7th from 10:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. This is a very important time of year to remember to donate so that the Community Blood Bank won't have to worry about blood shortages. CHRISTMAS FUDGE

Start with:

2 cups sugar

3/4 cups milk

11/2 cups miniture marshmellows

Grease a 9 inch square pan

Cook above mixture until it starts to boil (about 6 minutes) Remove from heat and add:

1 6-ounce package of chocolate chips

1 stick of margarine

1 can of pecans

Beat 4 to 5 minutes by hand

Pour into pan and let set until firm

Cut and serve

CHESSY BROCCOLI TURKEY BAKE

Ingredients:

- 1 12-ounce package Home Style Frozen Egg Noodles
- 1 11-ounce can cheddar cheese soup
- 1 5-ounce can evaporated milk
- 1 teaspoon instant minced onion
- 2 cups diced turkey
- 1 4-ounce can mushroom pieces, drained (optional)
- 1 10-ounce package chopped broccoli, thawed
- 1 cup shredded mild cheddar cheese

Preheat oven to 350°. Cook noodles in boiling water 20 minutes. Blend soup and milk into a smooth sauce. Add onions and mushrooms. Drain noodles. Layer 1½ cups noodles, ⅓ cup tuna and 1 cup broccoli in a 2-quart casserole. Pour in 1 cup of sauce. Repeat layers. Bake 20 minutes. Then add cheese and bake 15 more minutes. Makes 6 one-cup servings.

CROCK POT HOME-STYLE BEAN SOUP

Ingredients:

- 1 pound dry navy beans (soaked overnight)
- 2 quarts water
- 1 pound meaty hambone or pieces
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup chopped onion
- 1 bay leaf
- 3 sprigs celery leaves
- 6 whole peppercorns

Put all ingredients in Crock Pot. Cover and cook on Low 10 to 12 hours (or High 5 to 6 hours). Remove bones, bay leaf, peppercorns and celery springs before serving. Taste for salt adjustment. Trim meat from hambone and return cut-up pieces to soup. Makes 8-10 servings.

From the Archives

PART THREE IN A SERIES


While reading this article please remember all references made to now, presently or today are referring to 1955.

The exact date of the installation of the telephone exchange is not known, but we have secured the following from the October 25th, 1899 edition of the Homer Enterprise: "Dr. G. L. Williamson, who is always quick to take advantage of modern methods and the latest practical ways of doing things, was the first subscriber to the White Telephone Exchange. The doctor took a phone first because he believed the telephone would be beneficial to his business. And now since he is receiving from one to five calls for professional services over the phone daily and as high as three in one night, he feels that he did not err in his judgement. What the telephone had done for the doctor, it will do for all other lines of business in Homer. The telephone is not only a great labor and time saver, but a business bringer a well. No business man should think of doing without one." J. G. White owned he first exchange but, before the exchange was installed, a telephone was put into the E. T. Mudge drug store and it is recorded that the first call was made to Danville for an order of drugs which were received the next day via Wabash Railroad. Mr. White sold out his exchange in 1912 to Douglas Telephone company and 26 years ago it was sold to a subsidiary of the General Telephone Company who now operates the system. Two of the first operators were Emma Willis and Emma Palmer. New dial telephones were recently put into operation, thus bringing modern telephone service to Homer on its 100th birthday.

In its early years, Homer boasted of a fine livery stable. Fine horses and buggies were for hire. The Stevens Livery Stable was located where the Christian Church now stands.

In 1904 the interurban tracks were laid from Ogden to Homer, connecting Homer with both Danivlle and Champaign. The station was located where the Bowling Lanes now are and regular hourly runs were made to meet trains from Danville and Champaign.

When the interurban came to Homer, W. B. McKinley

bought the ground for the Homer Park (not quite 30 acres) from George and Gertie Eggleston. The site started at the old covered bridge and ran east. In the spring of 1905, C. B. Burkhardt took charge of Homer Park and built the first cabin which was on the site of Old Homer. Numerous other cabins were built, among them "Homer House," which was located on the east side of the road. This cabin, "Homer House," was moved with the rest of the buildings from the south side of the creek to South Homer on the lot just north of the Presbyterian Church. The Strayhorn family lived in it for years, then it was moved on a lot back of the I.T.S. Station on West Street. From there it was moved to a lot on Caroline Street, north of the school, where Mrs. Mackey occupied same for several years. Then Florence Sharp and her mother lived in this cabin. George M. Porter, in the early days of Homer Park, leased a site for a cabin, and wanting this old historical structure, bought it, moving it the fourth and last time back to where it was built-not far from the Old Homer Mill.

People came from far and near to enjoy the amusements of Homer Park which included boating, dancing, roller skating, swimming, movies, pool hall and concessions. On Sundays and Holidays band concerts and free acts were held. One of the feature attractions was a black bear which the children loved to feed. Mr. and Mrs. Burkhardt retired after 23 years of managing the park. Several othermanagers succeeded Mr. Burkhardt and the park finally-closed in the early 1930's.

For many years the Homer theater furnished amusement for the citizens of Homer. Home talent plays, box socials, and medicine shows were conducted quite frequently. It was there that the first silent movies were shown, while music was played by home talent during the showing. The first sound movies were shown here also. For a while this building was used as a storage place for implements belonging to C. B. Butler. About 1940 this building was torn down and the lumber moved to the Oliver Smith farm where it was used in farm buildings.

About the same time the old Homer theater was discontinued, a new theater was started in its present location—the H. M. Smoot building.


As time progressed, Homer profited. In 1928 a concrete road was bult from Kankakee to Kansas. This was called Route 49. The new road crossed the Salt Fork on a new steel bridge which was in the same location as the old interurban bridge.

The Homer Waterworks was started in 1937. Many people questioned the advisability of such a venture, but by its completion in 1939, the people were well aware of the wise choice that had been made.

The town of Homer has always been considered a neat appearing town. People generally keep their places in good order as was the custom in the early days.

Although the population has not advanced as rapidly as some other towns in the area, the town has not lost in any respect. During a recent survey, it was determined there were 34 places of business in Homer, these places employing approximately 180 people.

During a period of years immediately after the last war, there was a lag in construction of new houses. Recently this slack has been taken up with the construction of several new homes. Even though new homes are being constructed, there are a few homes still being used that had been moved here from Old Homer.
