Stroll along Main Street and be moved by the beautiful Live Nativity in Wakefield Plumbing's window. Listen and rejoice to the music. Along the street you'll also see live Christmas trees decorated by Heritage K-5 grade schoolers. Their hard work has produced outstanding results. Just north of Dave's Restaurant, you'll find the Old Tyme Toy Shoppe, aglow with candlelight and magnificent stained glass windows. Come in and meet Mrs. Santa and her Elves and see, or purchase, the wooden toys and dolls.

### REC BOARD NEWS

The Homer Rec Board has been enjoying less stress than experienced through the summer. The Haunted House at the Homer school was well attended and the coordinator from the Rec Board was Lynne Krause. The cheerleaders, the FHA, and their sponsors are to be commended.

Plans for Santa coming to town have been made. The Housewalk was too early, so Santa will arrive at the Village Hall in Homer at 10 a.m. on December 20th. We will have the elf do Polaroid pictures with Santa again and there will be treats from the Rec Board and Mrs. Santa. Bring the kids!

The annual house decorating contest will be much the same as last year. Once again we will ask that stars be displayed. Prizes for the best use of stars in a display, a themed display, and conventional decorating will be categories again this year. The Homer Churches Cooperating will sponsor a new religious category. Judging will be done on Saturday night, December 20th at 8:30 p.m. Watch the local papers for further news.

#### **MAYOR'S COLUMN**

Several weeks ago, the town was filled with the fragrant aroma of burning leaves. This caused disturbances in some peoples' homes, especially those with asthma and allergies. As a result, leaf burning was on the agenda for the next Village Board meeting. Going into the meeting, I was reluctant to ban leaf burning—but felt some restrictions were in order. I wanted Homer residents to be able to exercise their freedom to burn or not as they chose. However, the arguments at the meeting were quite compelling. The smoke from burning leaves penetrates homes and makes breathing difficult. When the exercise of the rights of one person infringes on the rights of another to be safe and secure in their own home, a change is needed. The Village Board voted 6-0 to adopt a resolution to ban leaf burning. The ordinance hasn't been drafted yet, but it seems clear that once enacted, there will be no more leaf burning in Homer.

We currently have an ordinance that prohibits the burning of garbage, but allows the burning of paper and demolition debris. I believe this will be changed to a total ban on all burning with the exception of grills, wood burning stoves, and recreational fires.

The Village, private vendors, and the new recycling agent are doing a great job of material pick-up and removal. We have recycling of paper, cardboard, glass, and plastic; There's also good curbside garbage pickup by private haulers. In the spring and fall, the Village provides brush pickup and dumpsters for cleanup in May. The fall pickup may change from October to November to accommodate leaf pickup and the building of a compost area east of town on Village property. It seems certain that the Village will not burn, or allow burning, at this site in the future. With all of these provisions, burning shouldn't be necessary.

It is our belief that this action will improve the quality of life in Homer. If you have any thoughts or suggestions on how to implement this resolution, or how to write the ordinance, please feel free to attend the next Village Board meeting on November 17th and share your ideas.

Also, the board changed water rates to permanent summer rates. This is necessary to finance upcoming water projects. We have submitted our grant proposal for \$400,000 to help with the cost and should hear from the State by mid-January. Cross your fingers and call a State Legislator. The balance of the cost will be provided by 3% Illinois EPA loans. This will help us keep the cost down. ■ David Lucas







### The Mitchell Home

The lovely home of Wayne and Linda Mitchell and daughters Melissa and Megan is located at 306 W. Third Street. The house, believed to have been built around 1901, features gingerbread above some of the inside doors, large pocket doors, folding wood doors, frosted windows and very intricate brass hardware. A balcony referred to as "Granny's Room," from which "Granny" could hear what was said in any spot in the house, helps make the design of the house interesting and very unique. An area that was perhaps the servants quarters at one time has become a large, luxurious bath.

The Mitchells purchased the house in 1977 and have lovingly restored and remodeled the home to its original elegance, doing most of the work themselves. They have furnished it with outstanding antique furniture. Antique lovers will appreciate the grandeur of their collection.



### Jerry & Connie Messman's Country Home

This beautifully decorated eight-room home is situated on the Messman family farm three miles south on Rt. 49, and  $^{1}/_{4}$  mile east on 700 N.

It was built near the site of Jerry and Connie's 29 year home where they raised their family, and where Jerry's parents had lived before them. Many memories accompanied the old house even after it was moved to another farm 4 miles away.


Jerry and Connie's 4-year old brick home features a sunroom, fireplace, den and beautifully crafted oak kitchen cabinets. The oak trim is used throughout the house. A unique feature of the home is it's GEO Thermal heating system, providing even heating and cooling all year long.

### The Katterhenry Home

Dale and Julie Katterhenry are the proud owners of the home at 203 West South Street which formerly was the old Charles D. Babb home, an early banker in the Homer community. According to information given to the Katterhenrys, the original part of the structure is pre-1850 and has a two story addition on the south which


was brought in on a sled from the Old Homer Salt Fork site. It is now used as a kitchen and laundry room. During the Babb's occupancy, the upper story was occupied by their servants.

The Katterhenrys are fortunate to have in their possession a Babb photo album that was given to them by a neighbor. The album allows them to look back in time and view their home and the Babb family as they lived back then.

In refurbishing their home, the Katterhenrys have given special attention to preserving the early characteristics of the eight rooms and the exterior. They have enhanced the early atmosphere of their home by furnishing the rooms with family heirlooms and a collection of early furniture.

Some of the special features of their home are a wrap around porch, a coal fireplace, gingerbread above inside doors, sliding pocket doors and a built in china cabinet.

The Katterhenrys will be opening the first floor for your viewing pleasure




### The Wolf's Country Home

Terry and Jan Wolf are the owners of a beautiful two-story farm-house on what used to be the Michener property. They live just east of Homer on the Homer-Fairmount road. The Wolfs designed their barrier free home with the help of Jan's brother Steve Edwards. Mr. Edwards is an architect and graduate from the University of Illinois. The home was built in 1996 by Duane Piercy from Villa Grove.

This spacious 10 room farmhouse has an open staircase and a cathedral ceiling in the foyer. Their home also has a screened in outdoor porch, as well as an outdoor courtyard. The Wolfs have chosen a mixture of woods, baskets, and pottery to compliment the warm, inviting atmosphere they have created in their home. The downstairs fireplace provides a warm addition to the home as well. Jan helped design her spacious kitchen and has chosen Amish made oak cabinets to enhance the country kitchen look.

The Wolfs completed most of the finishing work themselves and are very proud of the home they have created for themselves.

### Don Saupe & Mary Anderson

This rambling brick eleven-room home at 204 S. Ellen Street features large porches, a tower room, a green house, a sunroom, fireplaces, and a portico.

Built in 1920 by Lucy Brown, a long time Homer High School math teacher, this home was designed by an architect to house a school for would-be teachers who were studying to become accredited. Although the teachers stayed in homes across the street to the east, they spent their days in the Brown home. Meals were prepared in the six room basement and sent to the upstairs by dumbwaiter. A Delco plant behind the home provided electricity and two large cisterns, which can be seen under the back porch, provided water. This wealthy family also owned several race horses. When the Saupe's purchased the home in 1956, it was still in a farm setting with a working greenhouse, chicken yard and a large barn with pasture behind the house. Although the rooms upstairs of the house had been designed by the Brown's, they never completed or finished those rooms.

The Saupe's have kept the house in it's original condition, finishing the upstairs rooms, and furnishing the home with many beautiful family heirlooms and collections.

Mr. Saupe is a retired University of Illinois professor of ornamental horticulture. The gardens around the home have been enjoyed by our community for many years.

### Tom & Sue Smith's Farm House

The Smith's country home was built about 1901 by William E. Yount, Tom's great grandfather and a life long Homer area resident. It replaced an older house which was torn down at the same location.


The house is on part of a farm that was homesteaded by the Yount family beginning in 1828. William Yount and his wife Florence took in boarders at one time. Their daughter, Pauline Yount Smith, was born in the house on August 3, 1902.

During Pauline's time, there was a beautiful leaded stained glass window in a parlor on the north side of the house. The Smiths moved the window into the dining room on the east side of the house where it catches the sun. The house also features frosted glass in the inside doors.

There were originally two porches; one on the southeast corner and the other on the northeast corner. The latter one remains as part of this country home.

The house was built with six rooms downstairs and four upstairs. About 1928, one of the downstairs bedroom walls was removed to enlarge the living room. Originally, there were three chimneys, but none remain today. The upstairs was remodeled in 1992 and the house was lengthened to the south. The downstairs was remodeled in 1996.

Tom and Sue especially take pride in the new kitchen cabinets which were cut from walnut trees grown on the family farm.



### The Wright's

Kevin and Kristie Wright's home, at 205 W. South Street, was originally built by the Current family, who operated a grain elevator in Homer. In the 1920's, Logan and Geraldine Hedrick purchased the home and operated it as a boarding house.

In 1944, W. H. Taylor purchased the house for his daughter Effie Taylor Parker and she operated it as *The Christian Nursing Home* for many years. Mrs. Parker wrote poetry and articles about her many Christian experiences. These were published and sold to the public.


Kevin and Kristie bought the house in December, 1979 and have spent many hours refurbishing their home inside and out. You will be delighted with the results of their work.

Outside the back door, near the deck, is a mammoth tree. A picture from 1881 shows it as a small tree.

The house has four rooms upstairs and four downstairs with large entryway. The downstairs has a beautiful open stairway, hardwood floors and the original tile fireplace. This home has gingerbread above the doors and along the stairway. The Wrights have furnished their home with furniture to compliment the house and are proud of their old pump organ.

Kevin's hobbies include collecting mementos from the Civil War and Kristie has a collection of miniature houses and pictures.

The Wrights will be opening the first floor of their home to the public and will have four Christmas trees available for your enjoyment, including, one upside down Christmas tree.



#### **Holiday Apple Cake**

Fall is apple time! My favorite apple for pies, desserts, and treats is the Jonathon. Here is a delicious APPLE CAKE recipe submitted by Shirley Miller that you can try.

½ cup oil

2 eggs

2 cups sugar

4 cups diced apples (about 6)

½ cup chopped nuts

2 cups flour

2 teaspoons cinnamon

2 teaspoons soda

Pinch of salt

1 teaspoon vanilla

Mix oil, eggs, sugar and vanilla. Mix flour, soda, cinnamon, and salt, and add to oil mixture. Mix well, then stir in apples and nuts. Bake 45 minutes in greased 9"x 13" pan at 350°. Serve warm or cold with Cool Whip or ice cream.

-or-

Make this pour-over sauce from Teresa Wilson: In a small pan, combine 1 cup brown sugar, ¾ cup water, ½ stick margarine, and 1½ tablespoons cornstarch. Stir and cook until thick and clear. Pour warm sauce over each piece of cake as you serve it.

#### **Hot Apple Pudding**

My Mother's old fashioned recipe for HOT APPLE PUD-DING is quick and easy. Cut 6 peeled apples in slices. Mix ½ cup sugar with ½ teaspoon cinnamon, and mix with apples. Place in 8"x 8" greased baking dish and bake at 450° for 15 minutes. Meanwhile, make this batter: Cream 4 tablespoons margarine and ½ cup sugar together. Add 1 egg, ¼ cup milk, ½ teaspoon vanilla, 1 cup flour, 1 teaspoon baking powder, and ½ teaspoon salt. Mix well until smooth and pour over baked apples. Bake 350° for 30 minutes. Serve warm with milk or ice cream.

#### Maple Apple Pudding

Here's another delicious recipe. In a small pan, cook and stir until boiling ½ cup maple syrup, 1½ teaspoon cornstarch, and 1 cup water. Cook and stir 2 minutes until clear. Add 1 Tablespoon margarine and poor into 8"x 8" greased pan. In a bowl, cut 3 Tablespoons margarine into 1 cup of flour, 2 Tablespoons sugar, and 1½ teaspoons baking powder until crumbly. Stir in 1½ cups chopped apples. Stir in ½ cup milk and 1 teaspoon vanilla. Mix just until moist. Drop by tablespoon onto syrup. Mix 2 teaspoons sugar and ¼ teaspoon cinnamon. Sprinkle over batter. Bake 350° for 40 minutes. Serve warm.


