Homer has six busy Girl Scout troops. Membership in Scouts offers the girls friendships, fun activities, new experiences and lessons in citizenship.

Cathy Lance, who is in her third year as a leader, has the youngest group, the Daisies. These five kindergarten

girls are learning the basics of Girl Scouting. They learn the pledges, learn about qualities such as respect, obedience, and helpfulness and do crafts. At this level, they pay no dues and do no fundraising. The Daisies meet every other Tuesday at 7 p.m.

Susi Garrison leads the first grade Brownies, with five girls. Susie is a first year leader, and is aided by the mothers of her girls. They meet every other Tuesday at 3:20. Susie plans interesting and varied activities for each meeting. The girls recite the Brownie law and promise, and each girl checks the caper chart for her duty of the week. They sing, play games, do crafts and learn sign language, which they are very quick to pick up on. Dues are \$1 per meeting, which pays for supplies for projects and other expenses. Future plans include a trip to Skateland, a pizza party, and a trip to Body Tech (?) in St. Joseph, with a lesson on fitness and nutrition.

Cathy Lance leads the seven second grade Brownies, with Tammy Pruitt and Rhonda Bates as co-leaders. They meet every other Thursday at 7 p.m., doing crafts, learning about people with disabilities, and about good citizenship. Along with the older troops, they participated in Christmas carol-

ing on December 20, and in the cookie drive with all the troops except the Daisies.



Firehouse Auto

n January 17, a new business, Firehouse Auto, opened on North Main. The business, owned by Tom and Tammy Franks, is located in the old Homer Fire Department building. They chose the name, because of their love for the Homer community, and since the fire department had always been there, they thought the name should somehow connect to it.

Tom Franks will operate the business with the help of Paul Harmon from Urbana. Between the two of them they offer forty-five years experience in auto body repair. Franks says their goal is to offer quick, two day turn arounds for minor collision repairs. Using the Standard Mitchell Estimates, Franks will also do insurance estimates. Although the business hours are Monday through Friday, 7:30 to 5:00, Franks said he will be glad to make arrangements for after hours estimates.

Because of their lifelong interest in auto restoration, Franks and Harmon, together, have a bevy of tools needed to do auto body repairs. Franks feels they have the same equipment (or better) than most body shops in the area, from the standard tools required: spray guns, sanders, grinders, and welders to the more unique, door jack. The door jack allows one man to remove an automobile door, change the hinges and put the door back on the car without the aid of anyone else.

Although Franks wanted to open sooner, he didn't rush the opening



date, and chose to do things right the first time, instead of throwing things together only to have to redo them later. His thoughtful planning can be seen in the changes he made in the building. The old kitchen is now a storage area, housing a huge compressor and other large pieces of equipment. Franks has run air lines across all three bays for more convenience. He also converted one of the bays into a clean room for painting. The clean paint bay is enclosed, so that overspray will be contained in it. By doing this, auto body work can take place in two bays, while painting can be simultaneously done in the third bay. Because of the size of the bays, Franks will be able to work on just about any size vehicle, even grain trucks.

Franks will use PPG paint products exclusively. He will have a mixing station and do custom mixing on site. The custom mixing will allow him to do special paint jobs for the more enthusiastic car buff, as well as eliminate downtime by having to go somewhere else and have paint mixed for him.

In the beginning, Franks and Harmon will be the main workers with family helping with the phone and odd jobs. As business prospers, however, he plans to hire a student who is interested in learning the trade. He looks forward to serving the community of Homer, and hopes to supply all of Homer's and the surrounding communities' auto body needs.







After the initial preparation of the body, which includes embalming, Kirby then meets with the family for an arrangement conference.

At the conference, the family chooses the casket and vault, the minister, organist and music, pallbearers, and conveys to Kirby any special instructions for the funeral. After the family conference, Kirby calls all the people the family has chosen to take part in the funeral. At the visitation, Kirby personally greets everyone who attends. It is part of his way of showing the family and friends that he cares about them.

Once the funeral is over, most people would think Kirby's job is complete and he is finished with the family, but this is not true. Kirby continues to think about the families he serves and once a year he honors the deceased by having an annual Christmas memorial service for them. At the service, he has a Christmas tree with a special ornament for each family member that has died. The family is given the ornament in memory of their deceased loved one. This year's memorial is scheduled for December 5th at 2:00 p.m.

While dying is a subject most people don't like to talk about, it is a fact of life. The worst thing a family has to do is make arrangements after the fact, when emotions are running high. Prearrangement packages are much easier on everyone. Kirby offers two prearrangement packages. The first is simply a list of the deceased wishes. It is a preplanned funeral listing the minister, organist, pallbearers, music, and any other wishes you might have. The second is much like the first, but you actually pay in advance for the service, casket and vault. This preplanned, prepaid funeral is a good deal, because it locks in the price at the current date's rates. If you prepay and prearrange now, and you die twenty years later, your funeral doesn't cost you the inflation of 20 more years. It's a good plan. Kirby also offers cremation services. Remember that dying is hard on those that are left behind, so help them by preplanning. Make the arrangements yourself and save them the burden of a last minute, rushed arrangement.

Kirby has an answering service and can be reached 24-hours a day. Kirby likes the Homer area and plans to expand his mortuary service in years to come as the Homer community grows. He plans to be a part of Homer's future, and he will continue to offer the community his personal dedication to serving the family's every need.

In March and April we are hoping to have hearing screenings, thanks to the Homer Lions Club.


Every Tuesday and Thursday we get together for a little stretching and exercising. It is a lot of fun and we feel better when we are done.

- 2 squares white almond bark, melted

Pop corn and empty into a large bowl. Melt almond bark in microwave according to package directions, and pour over corn. Stir well to coat popcorn. It is a surprise to people when they find it is sweet and yummy!

BAKED SWISS STEAK

14 oz. stewed tomatoes

3/4 lb. boneless round steak 1/2 cup chopped carrots

2T. flour - divide 1/2 cup celery 1/2 tsp. salt 1 T. chopped onion 2T.oil 1/4 tsp. Worchestershire 2 T. sharp cheddar cheese

Cut steak into serving pieces. Pound to 1/4" thick. Combine 1 T. flour with the 1/4 tsp. salt, and coat meat on each side. Brown in oil. Transfer meat to a shallow 2 qt. baking dish. To drippings, add tomatoes, carrots, celery and onion. Add remaining flour and the Worchestershire sauce. Bring to a boil, and cook 2 min. Pour over meat.

Cover and bake 1-1/2 hours at 350° or until tender.

Sprinkle with cheddar cheese, and return pan to oven just until cheese is melted. (Serves 2)

FROSTED MEAT LOAF

1-1/2 lbs. ground beef 1 or 2T. drippings

1 can Campbell's 1/4 tsp. salt

Golden Mushroom Soup Dash of pepper

1/4 cup finely 2 cups mashed potatoes

chopped onion 1/4 cup water

1 egg, slightly beaten 1 cup small bread crumbs

Mix the ground beef, 1/2 can soup, bread, onion, egg, salt and pepper. Shape into loaf, place in shallow pan. Bake 350° for 1 hours. Frost loaf with mashed potatoes, bake 15 min. more. Mix remaining soup with water and drippings. Heat and serve with loaf. ■


