### An Update

ost of us are aware that a new fire station is being constructed at the north edge of Homer. This project has been on the drawing board for several years and the need for additional space finally overturned the last remaining points of hesitation.

A project of this magnitude which affects a community will typically raise questions and prompt concerns. In view of this, *News & Views* went out seeking answers to some of our questions.

#### Q: Why is the new station necessary?

A: Space. As one firefighter put it: We're trying to put approximately 1820 square feet of equipment into approximately 1815 square feet of space. The department simply outgrew its present facility. Equipment, training, and services have greatly expanded over the last ten years and this trend is expected to continue. The department acknowledges a debt of gratitude to the citizens of Homer for their unwavering support of the department through these years. Without that support their growth and expansion of services would not have been possible

The current main station building was built in 1951 and is of cinderblock construction, which, in itself, complicates expansion. A few years ago taller doors were installed to accommodate today's larger fire apparatus. It was difficult even then to find a company to do the work on an older block building.

#### Q: What are added advantages of the new station?

A: Again space. The new station has five bays, a full kitchen, meeting room, radio room, and bathrooms, as well as a separate office for the fire officers and ESDA. The entire building is American Disabilities Act (ADA) approved. It would be nearly impossible to bring the old station up to code, and this is something that must be done.

It is a widely-held belief that in the very near future, volunteer fire departments that survive will have full time staff in the station at all times. We have prepared for this with room for sleeping, living and bathroom facilities upstairs. This area will not be finished at this time, but can easily be completed when needed.

In the extra bay space, we hope to soon house a 24-hour ambulance out of Champaign. Recent articles in the *News Gazette* have reported ongoing efforts to make this happen. This has been in the talking stage for over a year and it is *Page 3 please*



#### Fire District Update Continued

hoped that service will commence on August 1st of this year. It will be manned with a combination of Homer staff and staff from the ambulance service at all times. It will be a full Paramedic service, just as the ambulances that are now being used. The addition of this service to the community is something Homer fire-fighters have worked hard to accomplish. Early in the planning stage on the new building it was decided to plan space for this unit and its staff.



#### Q: What will happen to the two current fire stations?

A: The main station at 111 N. Main will be put up for bid sometime in the fall. Several parties have expressed interest in the facility, including new businesses. The South station located across from the Methodist Church on South Main will remain as it is. This station was built in 1978 to help cover the southern end of our district in the event of rail crossing blockage. The facility is still needed for that purpose, especially with increasing rail traffic.

#### O: How was the site chosen?

A: The department had been unofficially looking for a new site for several years and many sites were discussed. Most did not truly suit their needs. Late last year talks began with J. Richard and Diane Freeman. When the dust settled, the Freemans had donated a full acre to the Homer Fire Protection District. The department is forever indebted to them for their generosity. Their support will benefit the entire district for generations to come. The next time we meet them on the street perhaps we should let them know that we, as a community, appreciate their good deed.

#### Q: What is this costing and how will it be paid for?

A: Bids were taken from three contractors. The low bid came from a local man, Jan Schacht of Diversified Construction. Total cost of building including parking, appliances, and fixtures is estimated at \$348,000. Many things will help pay for this: sale of the existing facility, government grants, CDs and other savings, and incoming tax money. It is assumed that an expenditure of this size will normally take approximately ten years to be paid in full. All monies will come from existing taxes and outside money. No increase in current taxes is necessary to pay for construction costs.

#### **Q**: When will the new station be done?

A: The department hopes it will be in service around the middle to end of July. The original estimate was August, but the contractor has been able to stay ahead of schedule so far. An Open House is intended after they are settled in, but no date has been set yet.

Editor's Note: The Homer Fire Department currently has 26 members and all are dedicated professionals. They are able to reach thier goals only because of the community's caring and concern. The continued support is appreciated by all the fire-fighters—past, present and future!




## Saluting Homer's Volunteer Firefighters

## ALLEN'S FARM QUALITY MEATS

The slaughterhouse at Allen's Meats is open on Tuesdays and Thursdays, but the killing cannot begin until the government inspectors arrive. Once the inspectors arrive, Ron Allen, owner and operator of Allen's Farm Quality Meats, begins the butchering process. Allen kills a combination of approximately fourteen hogs and cows a week. Some of the kill are custom orders from local farmers. The rest are sold retail, either in bulk orders, or smaller cuts through the case in the store.

Once the animals are killed, they are hung in a carcass coller. Beef hangs approximately ten days before it is


butchered. While the carcass hangs, the enzymes change which causes tenderization to occur in the meat. hogs can be butchered the next day.

Allen's Farm Quality Meats must adhere to State and Fedral Regulations at all times. Size of the meat processing facility has no bearing on the regulations. Allen must follow the same rules as a large meat processing plant. One of the regulations Allen must follow is the nightly breakdown of all machines. The machines used to slice, saw, or cut meat must be taken apart and cleaned. Allen has an employee to come in at night and do this. Then each morning, before anything can be

cut, Allen inspects all the machines, as well as the processing room, wash room, cooking room, carcass cooler, kill floor, cure cooler, smokehouse, dry storage area, and hand washing sinks. If any deficiency is found, Allen must notate on a government Pre-Op Sanitation Report what the condition and deficiency is and also the corrective action taken. This daily record is kept on file for government inspectors.

Because of the recent E-Coli bacteria scare, Allen also does periodic checks for it. The process involves taking a swipe of the hog carcass in three places. The samples must then be sent off to be checked.

Even with all the state and federal regulations, inspectors



still make unannounced spot checks. Although the checks and regulations are sometimes aggravating, especially when Allen is extremely busy, he doesn't worry because he is ready. The regulations are also a benefit to Allen's customers, because not only is the beef and pork home grown, the meat also passes all health and safe-

ty inspections.

Allen has three full-time employees and three part-time employees. He has owned and operated the business for the past twelve yuears. The business is open six days a week, Monday through Friday, 7:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. and Saturday, 7:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon. Allen's Farm Quality Meats offers a fine selection of chops, steaks, hamburger, bacon, ribs, and about anything you need for the grill or the freezer. Stop by and visit. Allen would love to chat with you and he is more than happy to offer advice on special cuts or help you choose the right meat for the special dinner you're planning. ## FOCUSING ON HOMER'S BUSINESSES


## THE GAMERS

he British are coming! As well as the Virginians, Californians, South Africans, Coloradans, Ohioans and Germans. In fact, in the fall of each year, for the last nine years, people from all over the world have descended upon a little building on West Fourth Street in Homer for four days with one thing on their minds. They come to get out their dice, their maps and their rule books and change the course of history. Yes, these folks come to Homer each and every year just to play military history wargames!

For those of you that have wondered what goes on in that little Quonset hut at 500 West Fourth Street, with the name *The Gamers, Inc* out front, it is very simple. Dean Essig and his wife Sara, (along with two faithful employees) design, produce and sell some of the best military history games in the world. The world has noticed and people from every continent enjoy buying games from *The Gamers*.

Starting out in their living room with an idea and a game design, Dean and Sara have built a small business that has grown into a mail order bonanza. With a customer list of over 7500 (and growing each and every day) The Gamers supplies the world with new quality military history wargames every year. With series on the Civil War and Napoleon, Standard, Operational, and Tactical Combat, The Gamers have provided entertainment and learning for many. The 39" game from The Gamers will be released April 1, 1999 and they are already taking orders for it. Along with the games, The Gamers produces a quarterly magazine "Operations- The War gaming Journal." Customers of The Gamers subscribe to the magazine to get the latest news on analysis, strategy and upcoming games. They also look forward each year to the issue dealing with The Gamers retreat, affectionately dubbed "HomerCon."

People who play wargames enjoy going to gaming conventions and while there are many to choose from, HomerCon has become a favorite with many. In 1999, HomerCon will take place from September 14th through 16th. The retreat is free- there are no sign-up fees and anyone is welcome. People come to play wargames and while most of the games played are from *The Gamers*, that is not a requirement. Doctors, lawyers, postal workers, tradesmen, salesmen are all equal when they get out their maps and coun-



ters. Some are ex-military, some are history buffs. All come to play games, meet new gamers and enjoy the weekend. Most will show up on Thursday, and play until late into the night. They will be back early in the morning on Friday, grateful for the coffee.

You must be the wife, sister, daughter, granddaughter, great-grandaughter, step-mother, step-sister, step-daughter, step-granddaughter, or step-great granddaughter of a Veteran that served during one of the following periods: WWI (April 6, 1917 -Nov. 11, 1918); WWII (Dec. 7, 1941-Dec. 31, 1946); Korea (June 25, 1950-Jan. 31, 1955); Vietnam (Feb. 28, 1961-May 7, 1975); Grenada and Lebanon (Aug. 24, 1982-July 31, 1984); Persian Gulf (Dec. 20, 1989-Aug. 2, 1990), and Aug. 2, 1990 to the date of cessation of hostilities (Persian Gulf). If the person that you are eligible through is still living, they must be a member of a Legion post. If they are deceased, they only need to have served during the previous times.

#### SPRINGTIME POTATO SALAD

6 cups diced peeled cooked potatoes

4 hard-cooked eggs, chopped

1/2 cup chopped celery

1/2 cup chopped sweet pickles

1/3 cup chopped onion

1/3 cup chopped radishes

1/2 cup mayonnaise

3 tbsp. sugar

1 tbsp. vinegar

1 tbsp. milk

1-1/2 tsp. prepared mustard

1/2 tsp. Salt

Melt oleo in 9x13 pan. Stir in brown sugar and cinnamon. Place slices of bread in double layers over topping. Beat eggs and milk and pour over bread. Cover and refrigerate overnight. Uncover and bake 350 degrees 45 min. Sprinkle with powdered sugar.

Future plans call for an equipment building. This will free up more room in the concession stand.

Major find-raisers throughout the year include food sales at community events such as the recent village wide garage sales and past Krazv Daze. The concession stand provides an increased variety of food at the games. Signs on the fencing at the ball fields are paid for by local business. Some sponsor individual teams. Local organizations and the village make donations to the youth league. All these efforts make possible a summer of fun and good competition for local youths.


