SARAH A. CLUTTER, 94, DIES AT HOME OF SON JANUARY 16

Residence Here Dates Back to Early History of Old Homer *The Homer Enterprise*Thursday, January 21, 1937

Mrs. Sarah A. Clutter, perhaps the oldest citizen of this community, whose residence here dates back to its earliest history, died last Saturday at the home of her son, Clell Clutter, east of Homer.

Funeral services were conducted from the family home at 2:00 o'clock Tuesday afternoon, Rev. George A. Reinhardt, minister of the First Presbyterian church here, officiating. Interment was in Homer G. A. R. cemetery, in charge of the Morehouse funeral service.

At the funeral rites the following obituary was read:

"Mrs. Sarah A. Clutter died at 6:00 p. m. Saturday, January 16, 1937, at the home of her son, Clell Clutter. She was 94 years, eight months and nine days of age when she passed away. She had been bedfast a month with bronchial pneumonia and on Friday suffered a stroke.

"Mrs. Clutter, who had 61 living descendants, was born May 7, 1842, near the old Kyger Mill on the Vermilion river nine miles south of Danville. She was a daughter of William and Mary Hawkins. When Mrs. Clutter was three years of age her mother died and she went to live with her brother, Dillard Hawkins. She had made her home in this vicinity 91 years. She was married in 1862 to Arberry Yount. He died in 1872 and in 1874 she was married to Samuel Clutter, who passed away in December, 1931.

"Children of the first marriage are George B. Yount, deceased; Mrs. Bell Robertson and Mrs. Ella Freeman, both of St. Petersburg, Florida; Dr. Joseph Yount, Chicago; Mrs. Fanny Brinker, Seymoure, Missouri and William Yount of near Homer.

"Children of the second marriage are Mrs. Iva Strong, deceased; John Clutter, St. Joseph; Arthur Clutter, Danville, and Addison and Clell Clutter, both of near Homer.

"In addition to the children there are 24 grandchildren, 26 great-grandchildren and 2 great-grandchildren."

Mrs. W. E. Satterfield and Mr. and Mrs. C. A. Morehouse sang "Beautiful Isle of Somewhere" and "Asleep in Jesus" at the funeral service.

The flower bearers, all grand-daughters of Mrs. Clutter, were Pauline Young Smith, Ruby Freeman, Helen Clutter, Nondus Clutter, Edna Clutter, Peggy Ann Clutter, Fern Clutter Reitchard, Neta Clutter Boyle, Betty Boyle, Roxie Morrison.

In Mrs. Clutter's passing Homer loses its oldest pioneer. Her residence in Champaign and Vermilion counties perhaps equals, if not exceeds, that of any other citizen. All her life, with the exception of three years, was spent in Homer and vicinity.

Retaining her faculties to the end, she was able to recall and recite first-hand early Homer history that must now become recorded history.

She leaves a host of relatives and friends to mourn her going. When she was age 3 her mother died and she came to Homer to reside with a brother. She had made her home here since, a period of 91 years. She was a girl of 12 when she saw the first train go through Homer.

She was married in 1862 to Arberry Yount. He died in 1872 and in 1874 she married Samuel Clutter who died in 1931. Surviving by the first marriage are the following children: Mrs. James Freeman and Will Yount, Homer; Dr. Joseph Yount, Chicago; Mrs. Clara B. Ried, Plain City, Ohio; Mrs. William Brooker, Seymour, Mo. Children of the second marriage surviving are: Clell and Arthur Clutter, Homer; John Clutter, St. Joseph, and Arthur Clutter, Danville.

In addition to the children 24 grandchildren, 26 great-grandchildren and 2 great-grandchildren survive.
