Death Summons For A. M. Coffeen Well Known Champaign County Resident Goes to Reward *Champaign Daily News* Saturday February 19, 1910 page 1

A. M. Coffeen died at his home at 1:45 o'clock this morning. He had been in failing health for a couple of years and confined to his room during the last six months.

Alva Martin Coffeen was born in Attica, Ind., February 11, 1836. When he was fourteen years of age he moved with his parents to a farm near Sidney. After graduating from Abingdon college in 1859, he spent a number of years as a teacher. During this time he was principal of the East Champaign schools as well as those of Urbana and Homer.

He married Mira A. Gaines at Virginia, Ill., April 22, 1862. Ten years later he came to Champaign to engage in the book and music business. In the years following he conducted a coal business and looked after his farming interests.

Mr. Coffeen was a mand of keen intellect and broad sympathy and took an active interest in the educational and social problems of the day. He is survived by his widow and by three children, Amy Coffeen and Fred G. Coffeen of this city and Harry C. Coffeen of Chicago; two sisters, Mrs. R. S. Hopkins, Chicago, and Mrs. S. E. Knox of Oklahoma City, and two brothers, M. D. Coffeen, Chicago, and Hon. H. A. Coffeen, Sheridan, Wyo.

Funeral services will be conducted at the home, 806 South Fifth street, Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock. Rev. John Andrew Holmes, pastor of the Congregational church, officiating.
