






WILLIAM RAY McINTOSH, B.S., M.A.




High School Orchestra

Pauline was also the accompanist for this organization.




The "H" Club

Evidently all the boys "came across" with the money for there were weiners enough for a crowd three times the size of ours, also plenty of buns, pickles, and marshmallows.


